

VICTOR INNES WILL FIGHT EXTRADITION, AC- CORDING TO ATTORNEYS

EUGENE, Aug. 21.—Mrs. Victor Innes, charged by the Bexar County, Texas, authorities with being instrumental in the disappearance of Elsie Nelms, is now in Eugene, Ore., where she is being held in the St. Francis Hotel, where Mrs. Margaret Decker, a nurse, has charge of her and is her constant guard, although Sheriff Parker has no fear that the woman will endeavor to make her escape.

Mrs. Innes was brought to Eugene at 5 o'clock last evening by Deputy Sheriff D. A. Elkins, who went to the Holden farm, where Innes and his family had been staying, Wednesday. Mrs. Innes, as the automobile stopped in front of the hotel, refused to say anything to the reporters, stating that she would not talk except through an attorney. She was hurriedly taken to her room in the hotel and she has remained there since with the nurse as her constant companion. Bud Kompp drove the deputy sheriff and Mrs. Innes down in his car.

Mrs. Innes is 48 years old and is slightly built. She shows the effects of long illness and the officers here believe that she is suffering from tuberculosis, although her husband says it is only the effects of a severe attack of pneumonia from which she suffered recently.

Paul C. Harbaugh, Mrs. Innes' son, who lives in Portland, was left in charge of the house at the Holden ranch. He and his wife arrived in Eugene yesterday morning and immediately left for the ranch. Mrs. Innes' twin children, Victor and Dorothy, aged six years, were left at the ranch and they will be cared for by Harbaugh and his wife, awaiting the outcome of the detention of Innes and his wife.

J. M. Devers, county attorney, said yesterday that Innes is still talking of bringing habeas corpus proceedings for his release from jail, but on what grounds it is not stated. Innes was advised by John H. McCourt, his attorney in Portland, it is said, to employ a Eugene attorney to look out for him while he is incarcerated here, but so far as known he has communicated with none in this city.

No light has been thrown on the mystery of the nature of the Government's charge against Innes. Charles P. Pray, special agent of the Department of Justice, who came here upon the news of the arrest of Innes and wife, returned to Portland last night, accompanied by P. A. Watt, another special agent, who had been here for some time previous to the arrest of the couple. Neither one of the men would say anything about the case yesterday. It is said that Watt has been in this section of the valley for a week or more working on the case, but when action was taken by the state authorities of Texas he was called in. There is no report to be made public on the investigations made by Deputy Sheriff Elkins during his stay at the ranch where Innes and his wife were staying.

Charred Bones Found.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—The arrest near Springfield, Ore., of Victor E. Innes, former Assistant United States District Attorney of Carson City, Nev., last Tuesday, was followed yesterday by fast moving developments in the mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Elsie Nelms, daughter of Mrs. Elsie Nelms, of Atlanta, Ga.

Warrants were issued in San Antonio, Texas, charging Innes and his wife, Mrs. Ida May Innes, with the murder of the two sisters in San Antonio on or about June 15. Charred bones, it is said, were found buried in the backyard of a house occupied by Innes and his wife in San Antonio last summer. Some doubt was said to exist as to whether these bones were those of a human being.

Requisitions for the return of Innes and his wife to Texas were issued by Governor O. B. Colquhoun of Texas, and deputy sheriffs left last night for Oregon.

Innes instructed Attorney John McCourt, of Portland, his counsel, to fight extradition.

A letter explaining part of the investigation which led to the arrest of Innes and his wife was received yesterday from Marshall Nelms, brother of the missing woman, by Mrs. E. H. Montgomery, of this city. Nelms made his home at the Montgomery residence.

Nelms says in the letter that Innes was found to have rented a house in San Antonio early last June. Although occupied daily, the window shutters were always shut, night and day, and a bonfire was kept going day after day in the back yard.

The tenants of the house also purchased twelve gallons of sulphuric acid from a druggist. Mrs. Nelms left her home in Atlanta, Ga., on June 12, and a few days later her sister left Atlanta. Both were traced to San Antonio.

House of Mystery.
The San Antonio house of mystery has been searched thoroughly, according to Nelms, and the back yard has been dug up. He said a partly burned tan stocking and part of a woman's shoe were found. Both have been identified by Mrs. J. W. Nelms, mother of the two women, as articles of clothing worn by Beatrice Nelms. There was also found a bottle with a label bearing the name of an Atlanta druggist. Nelms declares it has been established that the bottle contained a medicine sold to one of his sisters.

Nelms stated that the man who hired the house arrived with two trunks. He left the house with four, but also had two handbags. These were later recovered by the police, and identified as belonging to the missing women.

No one knows how the two Atlanta women were lured to this house in San Antonio. If indeed they did go there and met death there, not a cent of the large sums of money which the sisters had with them has been traced.

In the affidavit filed yesterday by Nelms in the Justice Court in San Antonio, he says:

"Victor E. Innes and Mrs. Victor E. Innes, alias Mrs. Ida May Innes, alias Mrs. Margaret Nelms, alias Mrs. M. E. Hadenmann, in the county of Bexar and state of Texas, on or about June 15, 1914, did, with malicious aforethought, kill Elsie Nelms, daughter of Mrs. E. H. Montgomery, by then and there administering poison."

County Judge Rice contemplates having a number of photographs taken in the vicinity of Pass Creek Canyon, where considerable road improvement work has been progressing of late. These photographs will serve to remind the sightseeing judges and commissioners what can be accomplished by spending a little money on the roads.

Two and a half days in the city jail was the sentence meted out to a negro, who was taken off from southbound passenger train No. 15 this morning in an intended conviction. When arraigned before City Recorder Winchell this afternoon the prisoner begged for mercy and promised to leave town immediately if released. He refused to pay a fine, notwithstanding that he had several dollars on his person. In his pocket Marshal Williams found a quart bottle, partly filled with whisky. This, the negro said, he purchased at Oakland before boarding the train.

Refusing to pay for a small stock of goods, claimed to have been delivered as a premium on stock which he was supposed to own in a Chicago drug concern, C. A. Wilbur, proprietor of the store at Malrose, this afternoon stood trial in the Justice Court for the amount of \$40, the balance due. Mr. Wilbur claimed he was sold some goods by a salesman some time ago and paid for the same, and did not subscribe for any stock in the concern. It appears that when his goods came they were accompanied by others valued at \$40 which he did order. A short time previous he claims he was baited to retain the goods by the receipt of

two small checks in the value of 80 cents each, supposed to be cash dividends on the stock. After listening to the evidence, Justice Marsters ordered the case dismissed. The plaintiffs, E. C. DeWitt and Co., of Chicago, were represented by L. R. Whipple, and the defendant by Attorneys Buchanan & Porter.

George Langenberg returned yesterday from points on Coos Bay, where with his family he spent about ten days. They returned by the train route, and with the exception of a few miles of rough road, had an enjoyable trip. While in Marshfield Mr. Langenberg was invited to attend one of the concerts of the Coos Bay band, and so impressed was he with their work that he declared today, "They have one of the best musical organizations on the coast."

Mr. Langenberg said the band was making arrangements for a tour of the cities of northern Oregon and would probably start from Roseburg, ending at Salem, where they will play for the state fair. He says the organization is supported by the people of the town, and they have a most capable director in R. L. Fenton. The band has 22 pieces and is composed of some of the most prominent business men of the city. While on their tour they will take advantage of the opportunity to do considerable boosting for Coos Bay. C. E. Oliphant, of the Antler's Theater, is said to be making arrangements with their manager for a concert here.

MURDER AT MARSHFIELD.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 20.—Coroner Wilkes is today holding an inquest over the body of William Bruner, an elderly man who was evidently murdered and buried along a stream on the Fox ranch, east of the city. A rifle ball was found in his head. Bruner was in comfortable circumstances, having money and property. He leaves grown sons and daughters, and had been making his home with Z. T. Siglin, on the latter's ranch.

Bruner had been missing since last Thursday, when he went fishing with Perry Lanning. A search was instituted when he did not return. Robbery was evidently not the motive of the crime, as there was \$17 in the pockets when the body was found.

Lanning says he became separated from Bruner, and thinking the latter had gone to some friend's house, returned to his own home Thursday evening. Lanning was one of the searching party.

POPE'S DEATH A LOSS TO WORLD, SAYS WILSON.

President, Through Secretary Bryan, Sends Message of Sympathy to the Vatican.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—At the request of President Wilson, Secretary Bryan sent today the following telegram to the Vatican:

"The President desires me to express his sense of the great loss which the Christian world has sustained in the death of His Holiness Pius X. By his pure and gentle and unadorned piety and his broad and thoughtful sympathy with his fellow men, he adorned his exalted station and attracted to himself the affectionate regard of all who felt his world-wide influence."

AS TO "WHY" THE ANTLER'S OPENS ON SUNDAY.

BOUNTIES ARE RECALLED.

At its regular monthly meeting on August 13, 1914, the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners passed an order removing the additional bounty of \$1 each on wildcats, lynx or bobcats, which has been previously paid under section 5, chapter 232, laws of 1913, and that no additional bounties shall be paid on these animals presented to county clerks on or after August 14, 1914. Payment of the additional bounty of \$15 each for cougar and \$20 each for timber wolves will be continued as heretofore.
