

RAILROAD BOND ISSUE TO BE VOTED UPON IN ROSEBURG ON OCTOBER 5

Following is a brief statement of facts relative to the proposed railroad bond issue to be voted on in Roseburg soon:

The Railroad Bond Issue Amendment to the city charter of Roseburg will be voted on by the voters of Roseburg at the city election to be held October 5th, 1914. Any citizen, man or woman, of legal age, may vote on this bond issue, provided residence in the state, county and city has been of the length required by statute, namely, six months in the state, sixty days in the county and thirty days in the precinct, prior to the date of election.

It is proposed to bond the city of Roseburg in the sum of \$500,000, which money, secured from this source, shall be used as an inducement looking to the securing of a completed railroad between Roseburg and tide-water at Coos Bay. It is specially provided in the charter amendment that this money cannot be used, nor can the bonds be negotiated or sold, until there has been first secured a contract from finan-

cially responsible people who will contract to build the complete road between Roseburg and tide-water at Coos Bay, and who must also as a guarantee for the living up to the contract to fulfill its provisions, deliver to the City of Roseburg a surety bond in the sum of \$500,000, which will be forfeited to the City of Roseburg in case of non-performance of contract, by which is meant the building of the completed road and the operation thereof.

From this it will be seen that the money cannot be squandered or misapplied, excepting for the purpose that it shall be spent for: the construction and operation of a completed railroad between Roseburg and Coos Bay.

It has been claimed by many that we propose to duplicate the Grants Pass method, and expend this money to build a few miles of railroad and then take chances on securing the balance of the road. This cannot be done under any circumstances and would be in direct violation of the charter amendment, and the commission in undertaking such a procedure would be financially responsible for all moneys expended.

This seems to be one of the main arguments against the bond issue and is unreasonable, as it is unjust, for the reason that it is not based upon facts.

The people's interests are thoroughly protected by the safeguards which are thrown around the expenditure of this money.

Another criticism is the fear that it will raise our taxes double what they are now, which is an argument that will hardly hold water upon careful investigation.

The bonds will carry 5 per cent interest, and interest on \$500,000 of bonds is \$25,000 per year. The assessed valuation of Roseburg is \$3,200,000, and it will require an eight-mill assessment, as eight mills levied against three millions and a half will raise over \$26,000. Our present entire tax levy is 31 mills, so it increases the total tax only one-quarter. Every citizen can figure to what extent his tax would be increased by the passage of this bond issue.

However, it is within the possibilities, and in fact is a probability, that there will never be a dollar added taxes on account of this bond issue.

Grants Pass with its short railroad into a relatively non-productive coun-

try has, within the past two or three weeks, leased this little strip of railroad on a basis whereby they receive an amount equal to the interest on their bonds, and the effect on taxes by virtue of this contract just entered into by Grants Pass will be that they will now have not one cent of taxes added to their regular expenses of municipal government.

SMOOTH SOLICITOR LANDS IN JAIL AT MEDFORD.

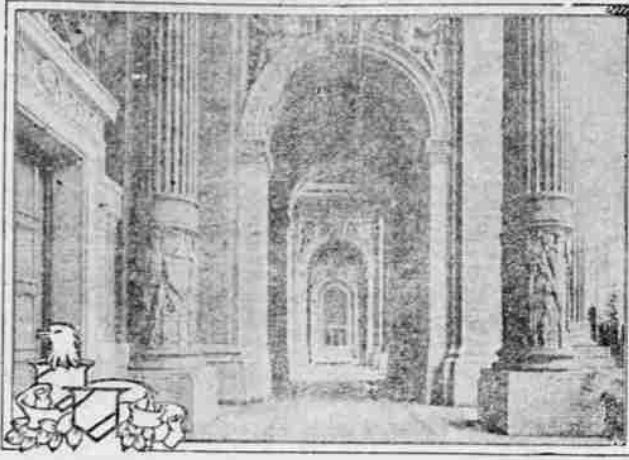
MEDFORD, Sept. 21.—Wanted in Portland, St. Paul, San Francisco and Denver, A. H. Berger, charged with fraudulent representation was arrested in this city yesterday afternoon by Chief Mege and Officer Cincade and placed in the city jail awaiting a hearing which will be held Monday. It is charged by the plaintiff, Edgar Winters, that Berger has been posing as a representative of a number of papers and has pocketed the money. Mr. Winters, who is the representative of the Nachrichten, a German paper printed in Portland, swore out the complaint yesterday afternoon before Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor.

Berger stung several Medford citizens whose patronage Winters afterwards solicited. He is a smooth talker and has apparently been doing well. His traveling bags are filled with all kinds of newspapers and receipt books. He has with him a list of subscribers to the Denver Post, the Nachrichten and several Eastern papers. According to Chief Mege, Berger has been working in the valley for several days. E. R. Speck and the Weinhart company are among those bunked.
