

EARLY GARDEN TRUCK
SHOULD BE PLANTED;
SUNSHINE IS VALUABLE

Now is the time to put in early garden truck, say those who know. Turn up the sod now and get the benefit of the early sunshine and you will also get the benefit of an early garden," said a gardener of this city yesterday.

He said he had already started to spade up his garden and had planted onions and peas. He said he would immediately follow with lettuce and radishes. Now is a good time especially to plant peas, he says, for they are hardy and will stand frosts without even a check on their growth. It is yet too early to plant corn and beans for frosts are sure to occur after they are up and it would be disastrous to plant them. It is also a little early to plant potatoes unless the patch is on the south side of a building well sheltered.

Here are some tips to amateur gardeners:

"The soil for a vegetable garden should be free from stones and easily cultivated. Wet land that cannot be drained, should be avoided, as all crops suffer more from too much water than from drought. Land which has a gently rolling or undulating surface, with a southern exposure, is the most desirable for general gardening operations, since it receives the full sunlight and allows the most perfect control of the water that falls upon it. A garden should be cultivated often, as cultivation prevents evaporation and so saves the moisture in it. Water should not be applied unless the crop is suffering for it. Whenever the garden has been irrigated, it should be cultivated as soon as possible to prevent the soil from baking."

SUTHERLIN CAPITALIST
IS OPTIMISTIC OVER
THE YEAR'S BUSINESS

"While there's a life there's a hope," is the optimistic belief of Frank R. Waite, who has returned from Sutherlin, and will again take up with the county court the matter of settlement in the Major Kinney tax matters, says the Coos Bay Times.

A month ago a settlement seemed imminent, but Judge Watson is said to have withheld his opinion and the matter passed along without any action. The county court at that time said they took the position that the entire matter should not be left up to them, as to whether or not the tax charges against the Kinney properties should be reduced.

Mr. Waite says there is nothing new in the matter, but that he still hopes some agreement can be reached whereby the entire tax matter can be adjusted so that the property can be disposed of if the chance arises. He probably will go over to Coquille tomorrow. There is more than \$60,000 due on the Kinney estate, counting in back taxes on some of the lands as far back as 1909, together with penalties and interest. An effort was made to top off at least part of the interest and penalties.

Not for another two months at least, said Mr. Waite, will it be possible to start the building of the logging road from Sutherlin that is to be put in by the Roach Timber Company.

He said today that in the next 30 days there will be more logging camps and mills open in the Northwest, and especially in Oregon, than there ever has been before.

In Portland an appreciable increase over the same months of last year and are an indication of a building boom, he believes.

NECKWEAR AGENT WILL
BE PROSECUTED BY THE
OFFICERS AT EUGENE

L. V. Stiles, who was arrested at Yreka, California, several weeks ago on charges preferred by a bank at The Dalles, was brought to Eugene yesterday by D. A. Elkins, deputy sheriff, after being acquitted on the charge there, says the Eugene Register. He is in the Lane County Jail.

Stiles was in Eugene following January 12, taking orders for shirts for the Columbia Neckwear and Shirt Manufacturing Company, of Portland, according to his receipts, and of which company he now claims to be an employee.

Stiles says that if there is anything wrong with the orders and the shirts were not received, it must be the company's fault, as he claims to have sent in the orders.

While on the way to this city, Deputy Elkins and Stiles visited the neckwear manufacturing company's store in the Phoenix building in Portland. The company denied that Stiles is in its employ, but admitted that he had been at one time.

The charge against him at The Dalles was for issuing a sight draft on the house, which it refused to honor. He contended at the trial that he had been given orders to issue sight drafts when necessary. The Columbia Company in Portland maintained that he had previously been authorized to issue the drafts but that he had been ordered to stop. Stiles was cleared of the charge preferred by The Dalles bank.

Deputy Elkins and Stiles arrived on the 3 o'clock train from Portland. Stiles' case will come before the grand jury which convenes this week. The charge of obtaining money under false pretenses was preferred against him by Dr. C. H. Marks, who ordered shirts from him, paying him in advance. (Stiles is said to have operated in Roseburg prior to being arrested in California.)
