ROSEBURG BOYS WILL CONTEST SALEM'S CLAIM TO STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Under the members of the Salem High school basketball team decide to play the Roseburg High School team a return game to the near future. The local team will contest Salem's claim to the state championship. This was made plain in a statement issued by Coach Johnson, of the local team.

The Roseburg team holds the undisputed championship of Southern Oregon, according to Coach Johnson, and he is in line for the state championship. To attain the state championship, however, it will be necessary for the Roseburg team to defeat the Salem team.

On a trip to Salem the Williams Valley team last week, Salem defeated the Roseburg team. On that occasion the Salem team agreed to play Roseburg a return game later in the season. Several telegrams have been sent to the management of the Salem team during the past few days, but in each instance Coach Johnson received a reply to the effect that the team of the capital city had its dates set, and could not come for some other reason.

Last night Coach Johnson dispatched a telegram to Salem informing the members of the high school team there that Roseburg would claim the state championship unless the Salem team sent a return game here, as promised. No answer to this message had been received at noon today.

The Roseburg team is convinced to be one of the fastest in the state, and the boys believe they have a chance of defeating the Salem team on the local floor. Should the Salem team be persuaded to come to Roseburg the game will probably be witnessed by the biggest crowd of basketball fans ever assembled here.

NOT AN ARREST

While other towns are making a great fuss over what prohibition has accomplished, it might be well to state that not an intoxicated man has been arrested in Roseburg since the night of Dec. 31. On that occasion two drunks, who were celebrating the passing of the year, were taken to the police station by the officers but later released. The court instructed the members of the jury that it was their duty to see that those laws, as well as the other statutes of the state, were enforced as far as Douglas County was concerned. Upon concluding his instructions the grand jury retired to their quarters preparatory to considering such cases as are brought to their attention.

On account of the fact that the grand jury convened here Saturday considered many complaints, it is not supposed that the present jury will be confronted with much business. At least, such was the prediction made here this morning by the prosecuting officers.

Will Argue Demerol.

Arguments for and against the demerol will be heard by Judge Calk this evening. The first indictment returned by the grand jury against Plaman set out that the crime was committed in the summer of 1922.

This case was also covered by Elmer Hermann, however, and a second indictment was returned. In the second indictment the charges date of the alleged crime was set out.

ETERNAL CITY COMING TO ANTLETS THEATRE ON TUESDAY EVENING

Increasing interest is being shown in "The Eternal City," Hall Caine's wonderful story that has been dramatized and will be shown in this picture at the Antlers theatre on Tuesday and Wednesday.

The story opens in Rome when Leone, officer in the Papal Guard, discovers that his young wife, believing herself deserted by him, has placed her son in a convent and devoted herself to the Pope. Leone seeks refuge in a monastery and he eventually becomes Pope Pius XI.

With great faithfulness and wonderful detail the moving pictures trace the history of Pius XI, the infant son, his being raised by the nuns, his experience after he falls into the hands of a peddler, who takes him to Paris to teach him to steal. His education on the doorstep of Dr. Rossini, an Italian and political exile from Italy, who takes him to his home.

Through the story runs a golden thread of romance in the love between David Leone and Roma, the doctor's daughter, while in it, too, appears the villainy of Baron Bonelli, Prime Minister of Italy and Roma's guardian after her father's death, who obtains her father's estates. The scenes in the Vatican gardens, in the Castle of St. Angelo, the Villa d'Este and other historical spots in Italy were taken with the consent of the highest ecclesiastical authorities.

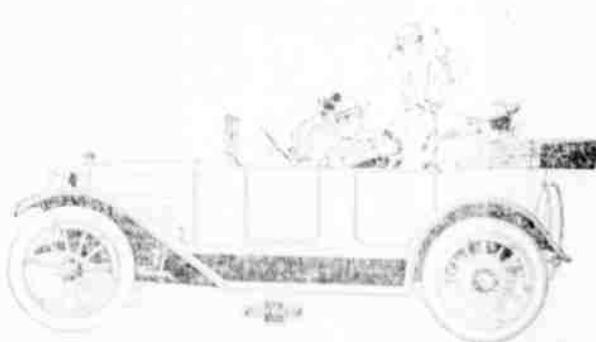

FIRST AUTOMOBILE IN DOUGLAS COUNTY TRACED TO JOHN R. SUTHERLIN

After some little investigation, which was conducted recently by Manager Fred Hamilton, of the local telephone office, it is believed that the date of the automobile's advent into the affairs of Douglas County has at last been determined. This date is June 1, 1903, when a Ford car, two cylinders, was sold to John R. Sutherlin, the price of the Ford then being about \$1100.

This date was recently traced through the books of Sam Sykes, the local hardware merchant, who brought the machine to this city from San Francisco. Mr. Sutherlin owned it but a short time, however, when in an effort to prove that the automobile could compete with the train service in the matter of time he ran the car into a telephone pole between Winchester and Roseburg. Shortly afterward he sold it to Grant Taylor and a partner. It was used here for a number of years in taking passengers on long trips.
