WHY TAXES ARE HIGH.

It is very apparent that Oregon now has the most narrow partisan Governor that this state has had for many years. He seems to never miss an opportunity to urge the voters to "stand by the party." Efficient public service is relegated to second place. It was only a few weeks ago that he was quoted as declaring that the state fair could "go to hades," when he was opposed in placing its entire control in the hands of his own particular clique. Such political narrowness smacks of the conditions of 40 or 50 years ago—the "yellow dog" era of voting. Fortunately a large majority of the voters now usually take a broader view of public affairs.

All must admit that efficient public service is far more important to the citizens than the success of any political party in controlling the public offices. Yet there seems to be a few individuals in this locality who are just as narrow in their views as Governor Withycombe. They continually shout, "stick to the party," and that means, among other things, bowing down to political bossism, giving heed or support to a policy has always proven very expensive to the taxpayers. Oregon has had nothing but a Republican Legislature for the past 28 years. The result is that this state is now credited with having the highest rate of taxation per capita of any state in the Union, together with the largest list of so-called freak laws. In consequence of these conditions it has become very difficult to secure investments of outside capital in this state so to "place the establishment of new industries within its borders." In the face of these conditions the Governor and his cohorts of "me too" followers are again raising the howl, "stick to the party." Possibly after these many years they conclude that this is a state wherein they can fool most of the voters all the time. That the taxpayers will go right on voting as

they are told to do by the political bosses, and then pay the penalty of bigger and higher taxes, and also keep away outside capital and industries. In Douglas County the present year the total tax levy is nearly \$50,000 more than the levy of last year, yet no unbiased taxpayer can point out any valid reason for this heavy increase. Can any considerable portion of the taxpayers show where they are getting any adequate return or benefit for this big additional outlay? Just so long as voters always "stick to the party" they may expect taxes to continue to increase year by year. These are not theories, but cold unvarnished facts. Two years ago "economy" was the especial slogan of the g. o. p. candidates for public office. Yet everyone knows that the numerous state bonds and commissions still exist and have fast upon the money paid by the taxpayers, and the tax burden, instead of being less, is nearly 150 per cent greater than last year in Douglas County.

Now about it, Mr. and Mrs. Voter, are you going to continue to "stick to the party," as the political bosses desire, to do your own thinking and your own voting this year, for your own benefit? It's up to you to decide this matter. Think it over.

GARDINER MILL COMPANY MAKING MANY IMPROVEMENTS ON THE STREETS.

(Gardiner Courier). The Gardiner Mill Company, under the management of Supr. O. H. Hindsdale, is making extensive improvements on West street between the post office and the mill store. Both sides of the plank road have been added to the planks. The old fences have been removed and the waterfront cleared, it being an eyesore to the place for some time. The whole landed front will be seeded, which in time will give this part of the town the appearance of a fine park. Beside this, the company has driven piling from the new public wharf to the upper end of their boom, and constructed a double walk from the public wharf to their warehouse, which, besides the convenience afforded, adds much to the appearance. They have broadened out the wharves in front of the store building and their upper warehouse, giving the company considerable more wharfage room. All these improvements add greatly to the appearance of this part of Gardiner, and will be very noticeable to strangers who may have occasion to visit the town.
