MAY PUBLISH NAMES

Persons Purchasing Liquor May Receive Wide Publicity

LEGAL OPINION IS REQUESTED

Petitions Will Probably Be Placed in Circulation Here Next Week Asking Council to Act on Matter

In an effort to curtail the number of liquor shipments into Roseburg and Douglas County, and to enforce the prohibition law more effectively than at the present time, a move was instituted here today with a view of asking the city council to have the names of all persons receiving liquor from California and other "wet" states published in the local newspapers. The amount of liquor purchased is also to be published in the event the persons behind the movement are successful in their undertakings.

While some secrecy surrounds the proposed movement it is understood that a petition will be circulated about the city and later presented to the council for consideration. This petition will merely ask the council to guarantee the expense and furnish the names of those purchasing liquor to the newspapers. One member of the council, when interviewed this morning, said he was in favor of publishing the names of persons receiving liquor, as proposed by those favoring strict prohibition in Douglas County. Several other councilmen, who refused to comment on the matter, intimated, however, that they would oppose such a move, for the reason that the receiving of liquor is legitimate under the present prohibition laws.

One man who appears to be heartily in favor of publishing the names of persons receiving liquor, stated this morning that the petitions would probably be placed in circulation here next week. In that event the council will probably consider the memorial at a meeting to be held on the following Monday night.

Before publishing the names those in favor of the move will ask the attorney general for a legal opinion as to whether the procedure would be a violation of the law. Some people here claim that inasmuch as they have a legal right to purchase certain amounts of liquor under the prohibition law, the publishing of their names would be of a slanderous nature and a violation of the Oregon laws.

ROSEBURG COMPOSER TO PUBLISH "BAT RAG" IN THE NEAR FUTURE

"Bat Rag" is the title of an instrumental number composed by Bertram Bates, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Bates, and one of the best known young men in this city.

detailed corroboration in the Van Papeu checks, which he cannot have known were in the possession of the British authorities.

The statement of Von der Goltz, as given out by the government, is in part as follows:

"On August 2, 1914, I left the Mexican army on leave and arrived in El Paso, where Consul Kunk directed me to report to Von Papeu."

"I visited Vice-Consul Kunk at New York. He suggested that I avoid being seen about the consulate and he would notify me when to meet Von Papeu. A few days later I met Von Papeu. I was asked my opinion of a scheme suggested by a certain Schumacher for raising taxes on the coast of the Great Lakes with a motionless army with machine guns. The proposal later was rejected owing to the embassy's receiving unfavorable information about Schumacher."

"I was then requested to assist in a scheme for the invasion of Canada by a force recruited from revolutionaries in the United States, aided by German warships then in the Pacific."

"This scheme, which was proposed by Von Papeu and Kunk, later was abandoned on advice of Bernstorff."

"Next Von Papeu asked me to confer with two Irishmen who proposed the dynamiting of railway junctions, grain elevators and the locks of the canals connecting the Great Lakes. It was hoped thus to terrify Canada, preventing the Canadian from aiding the mother country."

"I received the Irishmen, who brought me details of the plan before going to Baltimore to consult Consul Lueders regarding the scheme. I employed one man, Charles Tucker, alias Tushnet, as an assistant. I then went to Baltimore and consulted Lueders, who obtained a passport in the name of Taylor. He also introduced me to the captain of a German ship at that time in the harbor, proposing that I make use of part of his crew and one officer."

"Returning to New York, I selected three men to assist me and acquainted them with part of the details of the scheme. I received a letter from Von Papeu which was cashed for me by Mr. Stafford, a member of a German Club."

"Regarding the material, arms and dynamite needed, Von Papeu informed me that Captain Tushnet, of Krupp's Agency, had agreed to furnish them."

"A list of 'persons implicated' was written out by Von der Goltz. It contains 15 names and says several others knew of the scheme. Among the names are those of the German consuls at St. Paul, Chicago, Baltimore and El Paso, and the vice-consul at New York. Another name given is Schumacher, Edenbower River Farm, Oregon."

Denial Is Issued.
George Schumacher, one of the persons mentioned in the confession of Baron von der Goltz, besides with his wife and children on a small ranch a short distance northwest of Roseburg. He has been a resident of Douglas County about three years and is well known in this locality. Only recently he sustained the loss of his dwelling by fire.

When interviewed this morning Mr. Schumacher said he was a native of Germany, where he spent a number of years. In the year 1904 he left that country and went to

ing for shipment is to commence shortly, or as soon as the road to the mines has been put in proper condition. This road was constructed in the early nineties by the International Nickel Mining Co., which at that time was carrying on active operations on the mountain, but as it has not been in active use to any extent since that time, has at places fallen into disrepair.

Chromium, contrary to popular ideas, is not chrome iron, but is an individual metal, one of the elements of nature, just as nickel is, and is at present being largely used in the manufacture of chromium steel.

Present indications warrant the belief that such large deposits of ore will be uncovered that local mining operations may expand to very large proportions within the next few months, and if such is the case, it is needless to point out that our city and the surrounding country will begin to busy with activity and prosperity, such as we have never realized before.
