

TRASK'S COUGAR STORY.

WINCHESTER BAY BEACH ROAD NOW FINISHED

The new road connecting Winchester Bay with the South Beach is practically completed and teams began to pass over it last Sunday says the Gardiner Courier.

This road, which is a little over 6,000 feet in length, is a triumph of engineering skill and road building. Nothing in Douglas County can compare with it and it is very doubtful if there is another alone road outside of the Columbia Highway that equals it.

The road follows the contour of the bluffs between Winchester Bay and the South Beach in sweeping curves with a grade of less than four per cent until it reaches a point of over one hundred feet above Winchester Heads, and with the same grade again descends to the beach. The road is cut through sand-

stone, and excepting at two points, the roadbed is wide enough to allow teams or autos to pass without any difficulty.

The view from the different points on the grade are grand and must be seen before they can be truly realized. From every curve the scenery shifts and change like a great panorama.

Looking out to sea an expansive seascape presents itself from Hecla Heads to Cape Arago along the coast and westward to where the ocean meets the sky, relieved by ocean grey-bunnies and the white-winged crafts ploughing their way at times through heaving billows and at times through restful, peaceful waters.

Turning to the east, the eye can follow the long and graceful curves of the bluffs and the perspective narrows to a ribbon, its banks fringed with verdure which gives a setting rarely seen.

Out of the confusion the road passes through a forest of large timber from Winchester Bay to the beach, something which is rarely found on the coast. In other localities where the timber reaches down to the coast it is short and scrubby, but here it is thick, tall and straight to the very coast. Springs of the purest water are to be found at every turn, and a sheltered place rustic seats are to be provided, affording to one a comfortable resting place while feasting the eyes on the vista presenting itself to view.

As soon as the road is finished along the Umpqua from Winchester Bay to Scottsburg, thus opening a way by which the people from the interior of Douglas County, as well as those who reside from Portland to the Siskiyou can get to the beach, thousands will come in and not till then will Douglas County fully realize that she has one of the finest coast resorts in the state all of her own, which can be reached by a few hours' travel through one of the finest scenic countries to be found in the state.

But the cry is on the lips of those who know these things, 'Oh Lord, how long before the people of the county will awaken to the fact that they have been blessed with a much and more than any other county in the state. If they will only utilize it and not forever be looking for something beyond the boundaries of their own county, instead of building up and boosting for other sections and would spend their energies toward the uplifting of their own county, conditions of affairs would be much better for all concerned.'
