PROSPERITY IS REAL.

It is an old and true adage that
"none are so blind as those who will
not see." This seems especially true
to those who try to resist to
"calculated hostility" for political
purposes. These holdy assert that there
is no real prosperity at present in
this county or state, or on the Pa-
cific Coast, or in the United States,
excepting from the manufacture and
traffic in way materials. Persons or
newspapers resorting to such as-
sertions must consider the people to
be ignorant or fools.
Aside from hundreds of other evi-
dences, here are a few that are mat-
ters of record and may be readily
verified. During the two months,
from March 7, to May 1, 1916, when
the last official bank statements were
issued, the deposits in the Roseburg
banks increased at the rate of over
\$1000 per day. During the same
period the deposits in all the Na-
tional banks in the United States in-
creased \$241,000,000 and in the
state banks of the U. S. over \$100,000,000. During the past three
years the salary of the Roseburg
postmaster has been increased twice,
and these increases have been based
absolutely upon the increase of busi-
ness transacted. Just recently the
postmaster at Rutherford has given
a raise of salary on account of the
increased business done. The Post
and Telegraph receipts for May
1916, totaled \$99,819, being the
largest for any May in the history
of that office.
The bank clearing of the six prin-
cipal Pacific Coast cities for the week
ended June 18, 1916, compared with
the week of June 12, 1915, are as
follows:

Here, then, is evidence of nearly \$29,000,000 more of the corresponding week
of last year, and an one can truth-
fully state there is no "war busi-
ness" of any consequence on this
coast.
The grand total of bank clearings
for all the chief cities of the United
States for the week ended June 8,
1916, was \$4,282,865,000, compared
with \$3,085,825,701 for the corre-
sponding week of 1915, an increase
of the corresponding week of \$1,197,039,300 for the latter week.
As stated before, these are not
mere figures and show a volume of
business far in excess of any other
year known in the history of our
country. But this excellent proof
that a large share of goods is being
made in this country has been stated
by the witness, and substantiated by
the demonstration of the witness's bank
clearing from 1915 to 1916 and in-
cludes the whole of progress and
industry.
This will show to a king who to-
ward making judgments the great
business operations of the country in
now existing, and how rapidly they
are moving away from the banks, which they
could do in the past. Business and
industry have been so advanced in
happened and material.
