NOT PEOPLE'S CANDIDATE.

Among close observers there has never been any doubt that Judge Hughes was really nominated for the Presidency by the big interests. This was shown by the control of the convention by Senators Craig, Penrose, Stuart, et al. and the instant acceptance of the nomination by Mr. Hughes, after his issuance of several letters declaring he was not a candidate. It has since been brought out that he had cleared his desk of cases brought before the U. S. Supreme Court, at the time the convention convened, and when he was wired that his nomination had been accomplished he immediately resigned and issued a carefully prepared statement of his position on public matters and accepting the nomination. This at least shows that his former statements that he was not a candidate were insincere and tends to verify the statements of Progressives who were in Chicago at convention time that the big stand-pat leaders knew all the time that such was the case and that Hughes would accept the nomination—which he instantly did.

It is also very noticeable that of the so-called Progressives who are supporting Hughes those of the multi-millionaire class are very conspicuous. These include men like G. W. Perkins, and Gifford Pinchot, whose alliance with Wall street interests needs no further justification. Even the daughter of J. E. Moran has been called home from Paris to take charge of a women's league being organized in behalf of Hughes. This so-called Hughes alliance was formally organized at the home of Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, hostess, Long Island, on July 7th.

Mrs. Gifford Pinchot, who has been serving the Organization Committee as temporary treasurer, announced that through Fourth of July pledges, \$25,000 of the projected \$100,000 campaign fund had been raised.
