## ROSEBURG MAN AMONG HIGHEST SCORERS AT THE CLACKAMAS SHOOT

Sergeant C. A. Myers, of the Marine Corps of the Oregon Naval Militia, and Sergeant Roderick S. J. Hamilton, of the Fourth Company, Coast Artillery Corps, are the champion individual shots of the Oregon state troops, says the Oregonian. The two men tied for first place in the individual shooting match staged yesterday as a part of the annual state shoot now on at Clackamas, each making a score of 198 out of a possible 250.

Second place was captured by Captain William J. Williams, of the staff team of the Coast Artillery Corps, with a score of 195. Three men tied for third place, each making a score of 192. They are Sergeant A. J. Logeristum, of the Eleventh Company, Coast Artillery; Sergeant Lee A. Porter, of the First Company, Coast Artillery, and Private Gaffa Morback, of the Eleventh Company, Coast Artillery.

Fifty shots were fired by each competitor. Of these ten shots rapid-fire were taken at 200 yards, 20 shots slow-fire at 600 yards, and 20 shots slow-fire at 1000 yards.

The results of the shoot yesterday will be permanent, as the ties must be settled.

The record made by the Eleventh Company, Coast Artillery, which has two men tied for third place, is considered particularly good for an organization which has been in existence only six weeks. The Eleventh Company, Captain Fred A. Gettins, was organized at Marshfield just six weeks ago.

## REPORT AT WEATHER BUREAU SHOW SEASON DRYEST ON RECORD

But for an October in 1895, when not a drop of rain fell, according to the records at the local weather bureau office, the present month appears to be a record breaker. On the night of October first there was .10 of an inch rainfall. For the succeeding 20 days the only moisture falling has been the light morning fogs and the evening dew.

Previous to October there had not been any rain since the tenth of September. This gives a record of practically 40 days without rain, which is an equal to that of the dry season of 1895. In that year the records show no rain between September 22 and November 2. Consequently no rain since September 10, except .19 of an inch on October 1, this year will doubtless be known as the driest season ever recorded. The reports at the local weather bureau station go back as far as 1877.

According to Weather Observer Wm. Bell this afternoon, there is still no rain in sight, nor will there be any precipitation probably for several days.
