MRS. IDA MARSTERS WAS DEFEATED FOR VICE-PRESIDENT BY MRS. WARD SWOPE, OF PORTLAND—MRS. MARY RUSSELL CHOSEN SECRETARY.

BREWERS' AMENDMENT WAS HIT

Roseburg Organization Given Second Place on Honor Roll—Normal School at Pendleton Was Endorsed By Delegates.

Mrs. Jennie M. Kemp, of Portland, Thursday was re-elected president of the Oregon W. C. T. U., receiving 52 ballots to 32 cast for Mrs. Mary Mallet, of Portland, according to word received from Pendleton today.

Mrs. Ward Swope, of Portland, was elected vice president over Mrs. Ida Marsters, of Roseburg, the vote being 43 to 42. Mrs. Mary D. Russell, Portland, was re-elected corresponding secretary. Mrs. Madge J. Mears, of Shedd, recording secretary, and Mrs. Margaret Houston, of Portland, treasurer.

Pledging themselves to pray without ceasing, to work without tiring for the defeat of the brewers' amendment, and for the passage of the Oregon dry law, the heavily endorsing initiative amendment providing for establishment of the Eastern Oregon Normal School in Pendleton, the State W. C. T. U. formally adopted its resolutions for the convention.

Additional resolutions pledged the members to work for broadening of the scope of the organization, and to seek new members regardless of creed, faith or politics, and to cooperate with all individuals and organizations working for bettering the world.

Recognition was given the representatives of the 22 unions that had won the distinction of a place on the honor roll during the year. The Culver union, of Jefferson County, led all with a total of 359 points; Roseburg was second, with 280, and Pendleton fifth, with 175. Madras, with 257 points, and Chehalis, with 245 won third and fourth places, respectively.
