This amount represents the crop of 300 acres. The price paid by the company was \$5.50 per ton, and the yield averaged eight and one-third tons per acre, or an average yield of \$45.81 per acre.

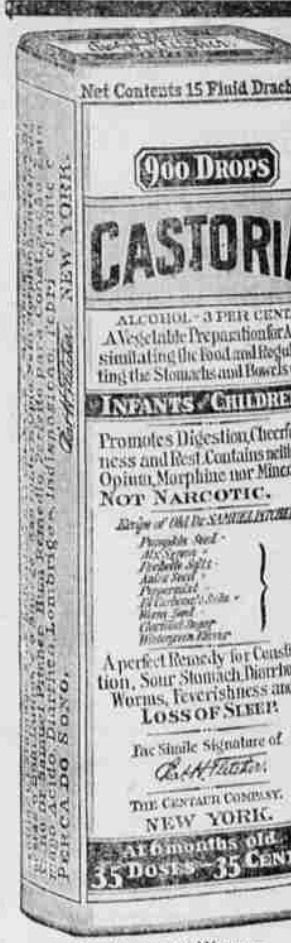
