When the sheriff arrived there he found that Donnelly had called upon a local person at Myrtle Creek by telephone and had later offered the explanation that a draft in the sum of \$100 was enroute to Sutherlin and should arrive there this morning. Sutherlin pending receipt of the money. Sheriff Quine later met Donnelly on the street near the Sutherlin hotel, and he was taken into custody. He first denied that his name was Donnelly, and threatened the sheriff with civil prosecution in the event he was denied his liberty and placed in jail. These threats had little, if any, effect on the sheriff, however, and Donnelly was brought to Roseburg by automobile.

In a subsequent conversation between the sheriff and the prisoner the latter stated that Myrtle Creek was located near Portland and Days Creek was a prosperous town situated on Smith River. These and other statements made by the prisoner convinced the sheriff that he had the right man.

Following their return to Roseburg Donnelly was taken into the sheriff's private office and searched by the officers. On his person the sheriff found a bank book bearing the name of O. Martin, of Days Creek, bank and check books bearing the name of Denning & Kent, C. J. Denning, Al. Kent and Mrs. Snow Denning, also a number of paving receipts and lodge certificates issued to the widow of Mr. Denning, some blank American Express Company money orders, a dozen or more checks formerly used by the First National Bank, of Roseburg, a check book issued by the First National Bank, of Oregon, and some blank checks bearing actions involving Donnelly will come the name of the Roseburg National to light within the next few days.

The officers believe Donnelly intended to sell the cattle purchased at Sutherlin and make his get-away with the money.

Bad Check Passed. Sheriff Quine learned today that Donnelly passed a worthless check in the sum of \$2 on Teddy Anderson of that city last Saturday. The check arrived at a local bank this morning and was pronounced worthless. It was also learned by the sheriff that the prisoner refused to pay a bill of \$9 cents which he contracted at the telephone office at Sutherlin. It is believed that other shady transactions, and some blank checks bearing actions involving Donnelly will come the name of the Roseburg National to light within the next few days.
