

LITTLE LEARNED ABOUT TRAGEDY

THOMAS CUMMINGS IS SAID TO HAVE PROMISED TO MARRY MYRTLE WHITE—GIRL'S FUNERAL WAS HELD AT SALEM TODAY.

CARTRIDGES LOCATED IN HOTEL

Officers Question Lillian Knightlinger But Little is Learned Regarding the Details of the Double Tragedy.

Although the Salem officers have exerted every effort in hope of ascertaining the cause of the shooting of Thomas Cummings Tuesday afternoon, their work has been in vain.

The Oregonian this morning had the following to say regarding the investigation by the officers:

Developments today in the double tragedy of yesterday, in which Myrtle White, young Portland girl, shot and killed Thomas W. Cummings, night clerk at the Marion Hotel, and was well known to a number of Roseburg people.

For this reason, it is said, Miss Knightlinger may have been so frightened she offered no attempt to take the gun away from Miss White before the girl committed suicide.

But little arose today to change any of the facts first fathered in reference to the circumstances surrounding the double killing.

Miss Knightlinger, after cross-examination by District Attorney Ringo and Police Matron Shank, varied her statements in no wise. She added, however, that Miss White, the morning that they retired in the room at the Marion Hotel, had carefully arranged five cartridges around a small clock on the dresser in the room.

From this and other details of the shooting, the police believe that the girl planned the shooting before coming to Salem.

The body of Mr. Cummings will be removed tomorrow to Halsey, Ore., where the funeral and burial will take place. The funeral of Miss Myrtle White will be held tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock from the undertaking parlors in this city.
