MEDFORD LOSES BOND ISSUE SUIT

INJUNCTION RESTRAINING THE CITY OF MEDFORD FROM SELLING \$300,000 WORTH OF RAILROAD BONDS IS MADE PERMANENT.

DEMURRER CHARGES CONSPIRACY

Judge Hamilton Held That the Proposed Mortgage Upon the Rogue River Valley Railroad Was Not Authorized.

In a decision rendered here this week Judge J. W. Hamilton overruled the demurrer filed by the city of Medford and other defendants in the injunction proceedings filed by Charles H. Colby and other taxpayers of that city against the city council, the Southern Oregon Traction Company and S. S. Bullis, to prevent the city of Medford from entering into the proposed contract for the sale of \$300,000 of Blue Ledge railroad bonds.

The decision of Judge Hamilton sustains and perpetuates the injunction, is sweeping in its scope, and renders it practically useless for the city to undertake to proceed further in the matter, as the court holds that the contract entered into between the city and the Southern Oregon Traction Company is not the contract authorized by the voters, but one entirely different, and not binding on the company to build any stated amount of road, or in any manner following out the intention of the voters.

The court also holds that the assumption of the \$27,000 mortgage upon the Rogue River Valley Railroad by the city was not authorized by the charter amendment. Sufficient evidence of conspiracy and fraud is declared existing to invalidate proceedings through the agreement declared in the complaint existing between the city of Medford and S. S. Bullis, whereby the transaction is merely a loan of credit by the city to the traction company.

The motion was argued before Judge Hamilton some time ago, and was contested by the opposing attorneys.
