Mrs. Lill and her daughter are now in Eugene, where the latter's husband is employed as engineer by the Southern Pacific Company.

SIMON CARO WON ACTION AT SALEM

LOCAL MERCHANT IS GIVEN A MODIFIED DECREE BY THE OREGON SUPREME COURT IN A DECISION HANDED DOWN LATE TUESDAY.

ATTORNEY J. O. WATSON ELATED

Under the Terms of the Decree Mr. Caro Must Pay Mr. Wollenberg the Sum of About \$7500—Property Surrendered.

An important decree was handed down by the Oregon Supreme Court at Salem late Tuesday, when the members of that body rendered a decision modifying the verdict of the lower court and holding that Simon Caro, a local merchant, was indebted to Hyman Wollenberg in the sum of \$7,224.17, instead of in the amount of \$9,901.

In the decree just rendered by the Supreme Court, it is set out that prior to the year 1895, Simon Caro and Isadore Caro were indebted to Hyman Wollenberg in the sum of \$16,500, which involved two mortgages held by the latter, with interest at the rate of 8 per cent. In the year 1895, Simon and Isadore Caro decided the property involved in the action to Mr. Wollenberg, but remained in actual possession of the same and paid interest on the debt until the year 1899, when they surrendered the premises to the latter under an alleged agreement that Mr. Wollenberg was to collect the rents and other profits realized from the property and apply the same on the mortgage debt.

Mr. Wollenberg remained in possession of the property until the year 1910, when Mr. Caro brought a suit to have the deed executed in the year 1895 declared a mortgage. Mr. Wollenberg answered the plaintiff's complaint and contended that he went into possession of the premises in the year 1899 as owner, and that the plaintiffs had no interest in the property. The case was heard by Judge L. T. Harris, then Circuit Judge of Lane County, and he held that the plaintiff was barred from any interest in the property under the statute of limitations.

The plaintiff then appealed the case to the Supreme Court, where the decree of the lower court was reversed and the deed was declared to be a mortgage. The Supreme Court also remanded the action to the lower court for accounting. The accounting was held before Judge Calkins, of Medford, in the year of 1915, and he decreed that Mr. Caro was indebted to the defendant in the sum of \$9,901. An appeal from this decision was then taken to the Supreme Court, and a decision was rendered by that body Tuesday in which it was held that Mr. Caro's indebtedness to Mr. Wollenberg on December 1, 1914 was \$7,224.17. In the late decision of the Supreme Court the case was remanded back to the lower court to ascertain the amount of interest that had accrued between Dec. 1, 1914, and the date on which the property was surrendered to Mr. Caro by the defendant. Under the terms of the Supreme Court ruling, Mr. Caro must pay the amount of the indebtedness to Mr. Wollenberg within a reasonable time, or the property will be subject to sale to satisfy the debt.

Among the items eliminated from the original decree by the Supreme Court Tuesday were two vaults located in the United States Land Office building, and aggregating a total of \$1,835, certain plumbing bills and other small items. The total amount deducted from the previous decree was \$2,670.21.

Attorney J. O. Watson, who represented Mr. Caro, stated this morning that he believed the final settlement would show that his client was indebted to Mr. Wollenberg in the sum of approximately \$6,500.

The property involved includes the residence property situated at the northwest corner of Douglas and Jackson streets, and the three buildings occupied by the United States Land Office, Humaker's cigar store and the basket grocery. It is understood that the property is worth about \$25,000.

Attorney Watson spent much time on this case, and he was quite elated today because of his victory in the Supreme Court.
