Dale Sloan, a 13-year-old youth, of Applegate, thought he wanted to join the army and he an imitator, says the Grants Pass Courier. Acting on this impulse he left home and journeyed to the city and applied at the local recruiting office for entry into the service. He represented to the officer in charge that he was 15 years of age, but as it was necessary to have permission from his parents, the enlistment was delayed a short time. Before his hopes of being a soldier were realized, his father appeared and took him home. Now Dale is again splitting the kindling and doing the chores, no doubt dreaming of the life that might have been his as a soldier boy.

Laid in Honolulu—

Warren C. Laird, who underwent an operation for appendicitis at Honolulu, while on his way to one of the Hawaiian Islands to take a sailing with a big steam company, is reported to have gained "satisfactorily" since and should be out of the hospital by this time, says the Marshfield Record. Several cases were reported to the health authorities here today of whooping cough that had broken out at points in the county. The cases reported this morning were at Green and Sutherlin. So far as known, no epidemic is believed to have been started here.

An examination of applicants to succeed the postmaster at Tenmile, Douglas County, who resigned recently, will be held within the next few weeks, according to word received in Roseburg this morning. Information from whatever source permissible under the law touching the suitability of eligibles will be given consideration by the Postoffice Department.

Civil Action Filed—

Constable H. B. Church went to Myrtle Creek this morning to serve papers in the case of Harry Gall vs. Charles Hoskott. The action was brought by Mr. Gall to recover the possession of real property, and was filed in the justice court of this city.

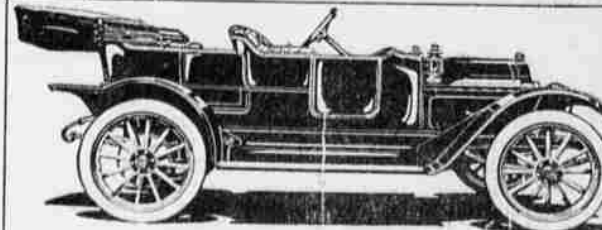

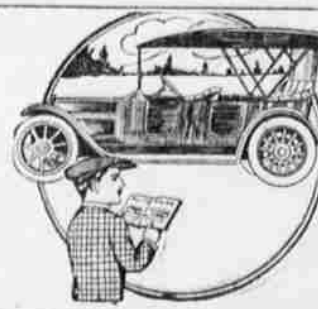
