OAKLAND MAN PLEASSED WITH EASTERN OREGON; BUSINESS IS BRISK

At Henriksen, candidate for county commissioner at the last Republican primary election, and one of the best known ranchers in the Oakland vicinity, arrived here today after a couple of weeks spent in Eastern Oregon and Idaho.

Mr. Henriksen stated this afternoon that business is at high tide throughout Eastern Oregon and Washington and both ranchers and merchants are enjoying unprecedented prosperity. While the crops may not be quite as large as in former years, the prices will be higher than for many seasons past. Upon his arrival at Spokane, Mr. Henriksen said he was obliged to visit six hotels before he could secure a room for the night. Similar conditions prevailed at other towns and cities he visited on the trip. Although the consumers are being compelled to pay high prices for their commodities, Mr. Henriksen says the wages paid in the eastern part of Oregon and Washington are high and they are well satisfied with conditions.

Mr. Henriksen will leave tonight for his home at Oakland.

FLAG RAISING WAS VERY WELL ATTENDED; ROSEBURG MAN SPOKE

An impressive and well attended flag raising took place at Oakland this afternoon at about 2:30 o'clock. The flag was a very large banner and the pole was 75 feet long. The ceremonies took place in the depot square and a very delightful program was given. The school children assisted with the exercises and were there in a body to honor the raising of the flag.

A very able address was given by Hon. Binger Hermann, of this city, who spoke of the meaning of the flag. "Nothing so enthralls me as the sight of that grand old flag," said Mr. Hermann, "and the devotion to it is coming to be significant to the whole world. When it is placed by the side of the Union Jack in St. Paul's Cathedral we know that the United States is a world power, for that has never been done before." Mr. Hermann gave a strongly patriotic talk and he was greatly cheered.

Delightful musical numbers were enjoyed and Mrs. Markee pleased by rendering several beautiful vocal solos. Commandant Markee also addressed some splendid remarks to the gathering, and at the close of the occasion, the serving of refreshments by the Honor Guard Girls was a delightful social feature.

SOLDIERS HOME WAS INSPECTED HERE TODAY; MARKEE WAS LANDED

That the Oregon Soldiers' Home, situated in West Roseburg, is in the prime of condition, was the statement made by Col. J. E. Miller just before he boarded a train for Portland this afternoon. Mr. Miller is the National Inspector for soldiers' homes and has visited in Roseburg on several occasions during the past few years. He was accompanied to Roseburg by Mrs. Miller.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller arrived in Roseburg Friday night and went direct to the Home, where they were the guests of Commandant and Mrs. Markee. During the former's stay here he made a complete inspection of the plant and found it in excellent condition. The Roseburg Soldiers' Home is one of the best conducted institutions of its kind in the United States, according to Mr. Miller, and the aged veterans should be well satisfied with the management. Mrs. Miller expressed herself as delighted with Roseburg and expects to accompany her husband here at some future date. Mr. and Mrs. Miller were the guests of Commandant Markee at dinner today.

HEALTH OFFICER WAS SUMMONED TO OAKLAND; LIVESTOCK IN RIVER

Dr. George E. Houck returned here at noon today from Oakland, where he was summoned to investigate complaints that several head of cattle and two horses had been drowned in the river there and their bodies had not been removed and buried.

While at Oakland Dr. Houck interviewed the owner of the horses and he promised to remove the animals from the river at once and have them buried. Dr. Houck also left instructions with the officers at Oakland to ascertain the owners of the cattle and see that they are buried without delay.

From what Dr. Houck could learn at Oakland, the cattle died from starvation. Food is very short there at the present time, according to persons with whom Dr. Houck talked, and not a few animals have died in that vicinity because of insufficient nourishment. Unless the orders of the county health officer are obeyed, arrests will follow.
