MEXICANS FIRE AT U. S. SOLDIERS AND ARE CAPTURED BY TROOPS

WASHINGTON, May 21.—A clash between United States troops and Mexicans was officially reported to the State Department. The message said that a group of filibusters had crossed to the American side, near Nogales. American troops and custom officials captured them. George Holmes, believed to be an American, and Manuel Gonzales, Hipolito Villa's former secretary, are among the prisoners. Another message described firing from a house on the Mexican side of the line on American soldiers. The soldiers returned the fire and the trouble ceased.
