

FORMER HEAD OF SCHOOLS IS HERE

PROF. J. B. HORNER, OF THE OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, WAS IN CHARGE OF ROSEBURG SCHOOL FOR SIX YEARS, ENDING IN 1890.

VISITED OLD FRIENDS HERE

During His Stay in Roseburg Today Prof. Horner Did Some Good Work for College—Many Graduates Here.

Prof. J. B. Horner, of O. A. C., who spent today in Roseburg, was the head of the Roseburg schools for the six years ending in June, 1890, during which time the school was taught in the old Roseburg Academy until it collapsed, then in the old Odd Fellows' hall in the same block, some of the departments being accommodated in the Masonic hall and the M. E. Church, South, then in the two story building which was christened the Lane school. All of these buildings in their turn have disappeared to give place to the present magnificent high school edifice.

Near the close of the session in 1890, President B. L. Arnold, of the Oregon Agricultural College, devoted an entire week to a visit of the Roseburg school, and at the close of the last session President Arnold offered a position in the O. A. C. to Professor Horner as soon as the regents could provide it for him. Soon the opportunity came, since which time Professor Horner has remained in the college, where he is Professor of History.

In speaking of the Oregon Agricultural College, Professor Horner said that "under the supervision of a great man as president and a large faculty of specialists, aided with some of the finest laboratories on the continent, the enrollment of the college has grown to almost four thousand students, and it is the aim, if possible, to open the school in October with three thousand."

"Recently the War Department, through General Bell, issued instructions to young men that unless they were called to military service, they could serve their country best by preparing themselves in some technical military school where they can learn the art of defense and the preservation of their homes. Under the present plan, the land grant colleges which afford industrial and military instruction will secure an increasingly large patronage as the present war progresses. President Korr predicts also that during the reconstruction period to follow the war there will be unusual demand for men trained in different lines of applied science. Therefore, all in all considered, the education of young men and women for the conditions that confront our country will be strongly emphasized by the Federal Government, the state, and the people at large."

In this connection mention was made of the large attendance at the Oregon Agricultural College from Douglas County through all the years, as well as the success and high standing of the graduates. Of the graduates from Douglas County, Professor Horner recalls Bert Pilkington, who came from Oakland, but is now employed in the college experiment station; Lulu Thornton-Brown, Alice Marie Cathey-Randall, of Sutherlin; Homer Morton Cross, of Drain; Harvey William Currin, of Drain; Russell Harrison Fleser, of Sutherlin; Jess Carmen Garrett-Canfield, Drain; Arthur Absalom Harrison, Roseburg; Vera D. PLANS FOR NEW DAM ARE BEING PREPARED BY LOCAL ENGINEER

S. C. Bartrum, superintendent of the Roseburg forestry offices, and L. G. Hicks, city engineer, returned here last night from the site of the North Umpqua fish hatchery, where they passed the day making a water survey of the river there preparatory to the construction of a dam during the present summer.

Mr. Hicks stated this morning that the proposed dam would be approximately 250 feet in length, and 18 feet high in the center. It will be of cement or timber construction and will be equipped with a modern fishway. As soon as Mr. Hicks can prepare the plans for the dam they will be sent to the Fish and Game Commission for approval. If satisfactory to the commission, actual work on the dam will probably begin early in July.

Other improvements contemplated at the hatchery include the installation of several new ponds and the addition of facilities which will make it possible to propagate trout as well as salmon. The money with which to make the proposed improvements at the hatchery was appropriated at the last session of the State Legislature, and is now available for actual work.

RED CROSS WORK NECESSARY

Men With Money Will Be Asked to Contribute Liberally, According to the Plans Outlined by the Committee.

Beginning June 15th, a campaign will be inaugurated in all the cities and towns of the United States to raise one hundred million dollars so the Red Cross can extend its activities to cover the great needs of our army and navy, and our allies. The time has come for action, the wake-up call has been sounded, and every patriotic person in this land of the free must heed the call. We must as well try to dam up a flood with sand, as to try to meet the German peril in a careless, "let George do it" way. The word "slacker" must be unknown in Douglas County. We have got to build a wall of granite, or prepare to suffer what Belgium, Northern France, Poland, Serbia and Roumania have suffered. The first masonry in that defense wall should be (aside from questions of military service), assistance to the Red Cross. No excuses, no procrastinations will do. This is no time for a person to say, "Well, so many calls have been made on my pocket book that I don't feel as if I could afford to give to the Red Cross." Such talk sounds like childish babble in a great crisis, such as this country now faces. We have profited financially from the sacrifices and sufferings of our brave allies during the past three years. We have become the market place of the world. The war has sent great riches, great prosperity to our country. Nearly three years of the prosper-

ity and security has been vouchsafed to the American people. We are now in the very midst of the greatest war known to history, and now, at once, immediately, there is need for action with all of our resources of men and money and sympathy—and the last is scarcely less important than the first and second. What are we going to do? It is up to the American people. We want subscriptions from everybody, rich, well to do, and poor. The war fund to which Douglas County people are asked to contribute must be a National undertaking in the finest and most thorough sense of the word. The crisis in this war is at hand, and the United States must play her part. President Wilson has named the Red Cross war council, and the following make up the personnel of this council: Henry P. Davison, chairman; Cornelius N. Bliss, Edward N. Hurley, Grayson M. P. Murphy, Charles D. Norton, ex-President William H. Taft, and Elliot Wadsworth. All of the funds raised during the time of the war for Red Cross will be expended under the direct supervision of these splendid American citizens. Let Douglas County stand in the front rank in this great campaign for the Red Cross war fund.
