Only two more days remain in which to complete that Red Cross fund of \$100,000,000. Our boys are going to the war front—one million of them—just as soon as they can be assembled, equipped and given the requisite training.

YOU MUST FIGHT OR GIVE.

Dispatches from Washington tell us that our boys—members of the National Guard—may be sent to France at once, not waiting for the training at the special camps in the south.

Did you notice that fine looking boy as he passed your door this morning? He was one of the first to enlist, and as the day draws near for his departure, suppose you follow him as he entrains with the rest of the troops, the Eugene Guard suggests.

But what is that awful din you hear?—the hum of many machines, the clug of ten thousand punches, the rasp of countless lathes? In the hur-r of them all can't you hear the hymn of Hate?

Of course you know why such hate is made. The place is Hamburg. Little brass shells capped with steel-nosed bullets, sharp-pointed, are being huried through with breakneck haste to the rhythm of that hymn to stop that boy you saw this morning.

Again he's at the front, in the trench—fevered with concern just before the charge. He's over the top with the first—a hundred whizzed past him but one of those little steel-nosed bullets found its mark.

Now time is everything. Hurry, pick him up, get him back! That bullet is doing its job well—but a moment may save him, that boy you saw on the street this morning.

Maybe that bullet can't succeed—for maybe it found your dollar in the way. Your dollar brought the stretcher to him, your dollar made the tourniquet that stopped the blood, your dollar took him back to the base, your dollar probed and found the little steel-nosed bullet—Your Dollar Was in the Way!

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DOUGLAS COUNTY GIVES ITS CHECK

COUNTY WARRANT FOR THE SUM OF \$500 WAS TURNED OVER TO THE COMMITTEE IN CHARGE OF THE RED CROSS WORK THIS MORNING.

MONEY IS MUCH APPRECIATED

The Check Was Made Payable to J. H. Wharton, Treasurer of the Red Cross Assn.—Help the Man at War.

Acting upon instructions of members of the county court, E. H. Lenox, county clerk, this morning prepared a county warrant in the sum of \$500, made payable to the committee in charge of soliciting funds for the Red Cross.

Whereas, the United States is now at war with the empire of Germany and its allies, and

Whereas, to the end that said war may be brought to a successful termination, the American people have pledged their lives, property and resources, and

Whereas, the American Red Cross is an institution chartered by Congress and dedicated to the cause of humanity in caring for the sick and wounded of our Army and Navy, and for the wives, families and dependents of our soldiers and sailors who have gone forward in the defense of our country, and

Whereas, it should be the paramount duty of every patriotic

American citizen, municipality and institution to contribute to the support of said American Red Cross in order to enable it to successfully carry on its patriotic and beneficent work.

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, in regular session assembled, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) out of the miscellaneous fund of the county to the American Red Cross, and the county clerk is hereby authorized and directed to draw a warrant upon said fund in the amount of Five Hundred Dollars, payable to J. H. Wharton, treasurer of the Douglas County Red Cross Committee.
