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Following the canvassing of the vote of the recent general election late yesterday afternoon, the members of the County Court this morning took up the matter of preparing an order authorizing an advertisement for bids for the sale of the county road bonds in the sum of \$555,000, which were adopted by the people at the time the election was held.

According to the judges' decision, the first prize was won by the block bounded by Lane, Stephens, Mosher and Rose streets. It was set out that the property at 242 and 246 Rose street should be exempted from receiving any of the money. The second prize was awarded to the block bounded by Coos, Kane, Oak and Chadwick streets. Property owners in this block are 311 and 325 East Oak street and two garages on Chadwick. The judges were W. J. Weaver, Bert Sutherland and G. V. Wimberly.

After adopting the report, the council took up the matter of having the prizes awarded to the Red Cross. This was suggested by Councilman Gile, who was one of the residents in the block winning the first prize. He said practically all the rest of the residents there were willing. He was appointed to have the matter in charge and Councilman Bullwinkel was asked to confer with the residents in the second block. The prizes were \$10 and \$20 each in addition to the attractive shields which will designate the blocks selected.

The Review last night received a lengthy telegram from Mrs. Mary H. Jewett, of Gardiner, who is at the head of the Red Cross work in that section of Douglas County. The telegram is self-explanatory and follows: "The Red Cross work started Monday in Gardiner and the untiring efforts of the much-esteemed Captain H. V. Allen anticipated the following persons to assist: Mrs. C. S. Benson, Smith River and Gardiner; Mrs. Janelle, Mrs. Weaver, and Mrs. Mary H. Jewett. Everything is progressing nicely and Gardiner will respond nobly to the call for assistance. Mrs. Mae Fields is collecting for members on Smith River. Weekly Red has the honor of being a life member of the local Red Cross society. The Gardiner society now has 115 members. The complete list of members will be published later, together with those who contributed to the Red Cross fund and the amounts subscribed by each."

Although on very few occasions have the local Red Cross collectors turned down offers of contributions, one such incident happened this afternoon which may be taken as an example of patriotism which but few people enjoy. The person in question was Miss Maud Wilhoit, waitress at the Europa Hotel, who volunteered her donation without urging. "I wonder if the waitresses will give anything," suggested one of the members of the committee who was at the hotel. "I'll give \$25," responded Miss Wilhoit immediately. "No you won't," returned the committeeman. We are not going to take more than \$5 from any waitress. In a few minutes each of the three waitresses at the hotel had made good the amount.

ATHENS, June 21.—The official gazette publishes a letter from King Alexander to Premier Zaimis, pledging co-operation with the allies. The king declared, "I am following with the utmost interest the government's efforts for the restoration of unity of our country. As for myself, I am willing to remain the faithful guardian of the constitutional charter, as I am convinced of the good intentions of the allied powers and will co-operate sincerely with them in maintaining tranquility and respecting the different elements of the nation."

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Red Cross contributions have passed the \$25,000,000 mark. Although active selling has been in progress but two and a half days, \$20,000,000 has been raised for the Red Cross fund in Douglas County at noon today. This does not include \$225 donated by the city council this morning and much of the money raised in the recent contribution of the county. The work will be completed next Saturday night, when a final report will be made by the committee.
