

BRIEF NEWS ITEMS OF THE CITY

Good Run of Salmon—

Warren Reed spent last night on the bay, returning home to the Campagna this morning, says the Marshfield Times. The run of silver salmon is just commencing and yesterday he made a shipment of about 12 tons of the fish. Yesterday a car arrived to be packed with fresh salmon for shipping direct to Boston, and such consignments direct to Eastern points will be a regular occurrence during the remainder of the season.

Vice President Will Speak—

Vice President Thomas H. Marshall will speak in Salem on Nov. 3. His topic will be "Democracy on Trial." Preparations are already being made for the event.

Building Road at Divide—

The stretch of macadam on the Pacific highway between here and Divide, which the state and county are building jointly, is about half done, and another month of good weather will see the completion of as fine a stretch of road as can be found in the state, says the Cottage Grove Sentinel. Between 110 and 115 yards of rock are being hauled each day for this job from the two crushers used there and large quantities are being shipped from the Matthews crushing plant at Eugene but the lack of cars on the Southern Pacific line handicaps these shipments to some extent. This piece of road now being built is 2 1/2 miles in length. To the south of it is another mile of road. This will be improved next year.

Hofers' Son Enlists—

Lawrence M. Hofe, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Hofe, will leave tomorrow morning for Philadelphia where he has been assigned to duty in the U. S. department for special training as machine gunner in the motor boat department for summer duty. He will be stationed at the League Island Navy Yard and later will be sent to Columbia University for advanced training. Mr. Hofe is the first one in Oregon to enter this service from this district since the Government has offered this branch of the Navy service.

"CAMOUFLAGE" ON AUTO SEEN HERE

KISSELKAR, WITH PAINTING TO RENDER MACHINE INVISIBLE AT A DISTANCE, FOR ARMY PURPOSES, ARRIVED HERE LAST NIGHT.

WAS SCOUT FOR MILITARY ROAD

Passed Through Here in August on Record Run From Border to Border—Drivels Anticipate Advertising Campaign.

The "camouflage" painting of a Kisselkar, driven by James P. Cory, and Charles M. Hillier, of San Francisco, which arrived here at 5 o'clock last evening, afforded many Roseburgians their first real impression of the painting scheme now being employed in the army to deceive the enemy in war. The car was used last summer to scout the military highway from British Columbia to the Mexican border and may be remembered as passing thru here in August on its return from a 20-hour run between the two borders.

On the present trip the car is being used to place the men in touch with dealers and the public, and to interest them in the Kisselkar and Federal truck, for which an extensive advertising campaign is soon to be made throughout the country. Mr. Cory represents the automobile company as a demonstrator, while Mr. Hillier is a photographer, charged to take pictures of the cars in different parts of the United States for advertising purposes. The latter is a noted commercial photographer and already many of his pictures of the Kisselkar and Federal truck have appeared in the leading magazines of the country.

The car seen yesterday was painted in a modified effect of green, gray and brown, and at a distance blended into the atmosphere in a way that made it almost invisible. Several pictures taken of the car showed that it also would escape detection by the more delicate eye of the camera. The color scheme was devised by artists in "camouflage" studios in New York, and will doubtless be followed in the painting of other cars for war service.

In carrying on the advertising campaign the men hope to place cars and advertising material in every city of any size on the coast, and subsequently will probably return here to supply a quantity of material for local use at a later date. The car has made several round trips between California and Washington points. The men stopped at the Elms Hotel last night and left this morning on their return south.

NEW WAR MOTOR TRUCK PRONOUNCED SUCCESS; TO MAKE 8000 A MONTH

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Details of the development of the Government's new war motor truck, announced tonight by the council of national defense, reveal an achievement that officials declare is second only to the production of the Liberty aviation motor.

Two of the trucks have been completed and are on their way to Washington for inspection. They are of three truck capacity, although engineers who helped in their development say they can carry five tons.

The truck is of a standardized construction and its parts will be made in probably 50 factories throughout the country. The Nation's best automobile engineers worked together on its design and it is declared to be the best ever produced in any country.

Later the Government plans to produce standardized trucks of one and one-half tons and three-quarter ton capacity.

The Government's first order calls for 10,000 of the new trucks. Within a few months the country can turn out, it was said, 8000 a month. After Jan. 1 the truck will be the only one of three tons capacity used by the army, although smaller ones will be used until they too are standardized.
