

DOUGLAS COUNTY, OREGON, BUDGET FOR THE YEAR 1918.

RAILROADS AND MEN TO MEDIATE

WAR TRANSPORTATION NOT TO BE HAMPERED BY RAILWAY STRIKES—AGREEMENT TO BE EFFECTIVE UNTIL THE WAR IS WON.

MATTER IN HANDS OF PRESIDENT

Concessions Made by Both Railroads and Brotherhoods Counted Complete Assurance That Tie-Ups Will Be Averted.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Concessions made by both the railroads and the heads of the four brotherhoods as a result of the present wage issue, is taken by officials as complete assurance that America's warlike transport will not be hampered by the end and undersigned by the possibility of transportation tieups over wage differences. The offer of the roads to place their interests in the hands of the President for necessary decision as to any deemed necessary, and of the brotherhoods to mediate any questions of wages, it was pointed out today at the office of the Board of Mediation and Conciliation, have not been limited as to time. They will be effective until peace is won. Officials believe that such unqualified adherence to the principle of settling disputes through discussion eliminates whatever strikes there might be of a traffic strike due to misunderstandings, and the ending negotiations, commencing Thursday at the White House, when President Wilson will confer with the brotherhood representatives, are looked upon as likely to make this local war certain.
