QUESTIONNAIRES ARE ON WAY; WILL BE MAILED DEC. 15, SAY OFFICERS

Word was received at the sheriff's office this morning that the supply of questionnaires sufficient for reaching every registered man in this county, was on the way and would probably arrive today or some time tomorrow. The material was sent from Portland and will be immediately placed in the hands of the local examination board, who send them out to the candidates for the draft army according to instructions.

The full particulars regarding the distribution of the questionnaires has not yet been received, but it is believed by the sheriff and other officials that the documents will be sent out about December 15. The rules and regulations regarding the new administration by the examining board have been sent into effect yesterday, according to the letter from Portland this morning, but the exact nature of the change of policy was not fully understood here. Further instructions are expected daily and arrangements for sending out the questionnaires will be made as soon as possible.
