UKRAINE OPPOSES THE BOLSHEVIKI

THEY HAVE REJECTED THE ULTIMATUM OF THE RADICALS TO QUIT AIDING THE COSACKS AND LINES FOR BATTLE ARE BEING DRAWN.

WILL ALLOW CZAR TO LEAVE

It is Officially Reported That the Russian Delegates Have Refused the German Peace Terms and Returned Home.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 21.—Ukraine province has formally rejected the Bolshevik ultimatum not to aid the Cosacks. It has demanded full recognition of Ukraine's independence, and both sides are making for battle. Proposals for a cessation of civil war, but emphatically demanding that the Bolsheviks not interfere in affairs in the Don region, and that a new national government be immediately formed, were made in communications from General Kaledin, the Cosack leader.

It is authoritatively stated that ex-Czar Nicholas and family will be permitted to seek a haven outside of Russia, in a decree to be issued Thursday granting the Imperial family's request to go abroad. This Bolshevik action is due to the insistence of the Germans in the armistice negotiations.

Report Terms Refused.

LONDON, Dec. 20.—An exchange Petrograd dispatch says it is officially reported that the Germans refused the Russian peace terms. The Bolshevik delegation was recalled to Petrograd. The stoppage of fighting for a month is still effective. If the report is true, it is believed the Germans refused to agree to the comprehensive concessions from the Russians.

Call "Rump" Convention.

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 21.—It is believed the Bolsheviks are preparing a "rump" convention to replace the constituent assembly where they were in the minority. It is said they might not even appear at the assembly, owing to their minority. The government is reported discussing anew the question of dissolving the whole assembly.

England Refuses Comment.

LONDON, Dec. 21.—The foreign office refused to comment on the German report that the allies had acceded to negotiations to Ukraine, which is seeking independence.

Eldred Shrum on Enclough—

Eldred Shrum is expected home this afternoon from the Naval Training school at San Francisco, and will spend a few days' furlough in this city and with relatives near Glendale. He is a graduate of the Roseburg High School and has many friends in this city, where he is well known.

COUNTY COURT FINANCES SQUIRREL POISON DRIVE BUT GETS MONEY BACK

The County Court has agreed to finance the squirrel poison drive which is to be distributed throughout Douglas County next spring when the concerted drive to rid the farming districts of the very dangerous squirrels is to be launched under the direction of the county Agricultural Council. Last session consideration of this matter it was said that the court has agreed to appropriate \$1000 in a revolving fund to carry on this work, but it should not be overlooked that the money which the county provides is returned into the treasury at the close of the season, so the farmers pay for all the wages and other expense involved at present cost.

The working of this plan will be in keeping a plan to go about the different parts of the county making the poison and supplying it to the farmers, who will distribute it about their farms under the direction of the county agent where it is well understood that a concerted effort will practically exterminate the squirrel nuisance, and thereby save much grain and other crops which they attack.

According to contemporary reports made by members of the court, approximately 20 cents per quart are being sold at 20 cents per quart. Under the plan that is to be followed, the spring it is claimed that the poison can be supplied to the farmers at 20 cents per quart.

PRIZE TURKEY ADDS OVER \$105 TO FUNDS OF LOCAL RED CROSS ORGANIZATION

All of the proceeds of the sales go into the treasury of the Roseburg society for the purchase of supplies or whatever needs may arise in connection with the work. The award will take place this evening in front of the Impqua Hotel at 7:30 o'clock. The lucky buyer takes the Christmas bird. The exact value of the turkey had not been determined at the hour of going to press, but at last reports it had reached a total of \$195.

PACKERS TRYING TO BLOCK PROBE

THE PRESIDENT OF SWIFT & COMPANY HAS REFUSED TO PERMIT THE FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION TO EXAMINE ITS FILES, SAYS F. J. HENRY.

THINK STOCKHOLDERS FLEEDED

Treasurer of Old Chicago Stockyards Company Says President Would Freeze Out Stockholders by Building Company.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—The great packers made their first move to block the Federal trade commission's food probe when Swift & Company refused to permit the Federal authorities to examine their files, according to Francis J. Henry, who is endeavoring to show that the stockholders in the old Chicago Stock Yards were fleeced out of \$2,000,000 by the packers. He will appear to the court as the defendant. The treasurer of the old company admitted its president had secretly agreed with Armour to form a main holding corporation, thereby freezing out stock yards stockholders. Henry attempted to show the stock yard managers were in collusion with the packers. The treasurer admitted the old company's directors were dummies.

TESTING FRENCH LINE

PARIS, Dec. 21.—A big German raid, partaking of the nature of a hostile head-on attack, was reported east of Ypres, near St. Quentin. An artillery battle is active on the right bank at the Meuse, and around Fleury, Thun and Hartmannswillerkopf. Apparently the Germans are testing the whole French front.

JAPAN WOULD LIKE TO OCCUPY SIBERIA; SOME DIPLOMATS FAVOR

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Advices say that Japan is anxious to strike at Germany by occupying Siberia. This report, together with the Russian publication of an alleged Russian treaty to attack any nation attacking Japan, has caused a sensation in diplomatic circles. Some allied diplomats favor the Japanese move in view of possible further domination of Russia, was pointed out by an American consul. Vladivostok said troops are needed there.

\$50,000 IS MADE COURTHOUSE FUND

COUNTY COURT DECIDES TO DEFER COURTHOUSE IMPROVEMENT UNTIL TIMES ARE BETTER SUITED TO BUILDING OPERATIONS.

TIMBER CRUISE WILL STAND

No Reduction Will Be Made in General Road Fund and Other Items Will Not Be Materially Changed—Levy 12.4 Mills.

Ignoring the recommendation of the taxpayers of the county asking that no improvements be made on the Douglas County courthouse at this time, the County court this afternoon made an order setting the \$50,000 proposed to be used for this purpose aside into a courthouse fund, and will instruct the county treasurer to invest that amount in Liberty bonds, with the idea of using it for courthouse construction when times are more propitious.

While the formal order had not been drafted, the members of the court announced that the item of \$10,000 for a partial timber cruise would be left in the budget and used for that purpose.

The announcement was also made that no reduction would be made in the general road fund as recommended by the taxpayers' meeting, and that practically all items of the budget could stand as submitted in the official notice.

The announcement is made by the court that the tax rate will probably be 12.4 mills, although a few items are yet to be gone over and minor adjustments made.

The order as to the courthouse fund is as follows:

In the matter of the item of fifty thousand dollars in the construction of jail and repairs of courthouse in the budget for 1918. This matter coming on now for consideration by the court, upon request of the taxpayers of Douglas County, Oregon, for the elimination of said item from the 1918 budget;

It appearing to the satisfaction of the court that at a public hearing held by this court, it seemed to be the consensus of opinion of the taxpayers and as made to appear by the petitions filed with this court that it is not of immediate necessity to construct a county jail and repair the present county courthouse, owing to the increase in the cost of material and the necessity for labor to be used in the production of food and other agricultural pursuits, and it further appearing to the satisfaction of the court and as made to appear by the sentiment expressed at said taxpayers' hearing, that it be expedient to set aside this item of fifty thousand dollars as a county courthouse fund to be used at such time as it may be expedient to reconstruct the courthouse and jail, when materials are cheaper and a greater necessity appears therefore;

It is therefore ordered that said item of fifty thousand dollars be retained in the budget as a fund for the reconstruction of the county courthouse, that same be set aside by the county treasurer of this county for that purpose; and

It is hereby further ordered that said treasurer be, and he is hereby instructed to invest the said sum in the first Liberty bond loan by withdrawing the amount thereof to said loan, and obtaining Liberty bonds therefor, and to retain the same until such time as may be ordered by the court; and

It is further ordered that any interest received and paid on account of said loan, same shall be paid into, become a part of said fund, and reinvested by the said county treasurer.

From this time on the local board will probably be in daily session until the last Questionnaire has passed through their hands, as the returns beginning with tomorrow become automatic, requiring at least an average of \$2 per day be received, as that number is being mailed out, seven days being the limit for their completed state.

SPEED UP LOCAL RED CROSS DRIVE

THIS IS THE WORD GIVEN OUT TODAY BY COUNTY MANAGER HARDING, WHO IS IN CHARGE OF RED CROSS MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN.

COUNTY QUOTA 7500 MEMBERS

Today's Report Indicates That Only About 4000 Have So Far Been Enrolled—Extra Efforts Are Needed to Reach Quota.

PORTLAND, Dec. 21.—The Red Cross total today is Portland 23,993 members, and in state outside of Portland, 58,159, making a total of 82,152 members.

Umatilla County has completed her quota, having signed up 7550 members. It is the banner county, having headed the Liberty Loan and previous Red Cross drive.

There must be a speeding up among the workers in the Red Cross membership drive, declared County Manager W. C. Harding today. So far the reports indicate about 4000 already signed up in this county. 2000 in Roseburg and 2000 in the county outside of the city. The county quota is 7500, and this is the goal to be reached by next Monday night. Hence every district manager was urged today to impress upon the field workers the necessity of redoubting efforts. Unless this is done, and the work vigorously prosecuted, Douglas County will fail to reach its quota in this membership drive.

In this city the district managers are showing no let-up in their efforts. The teams under direction of J. W. Perkins this morning reported the enrollment of over 700 members. They expect to make it 800 by tonight and hope to reach 1000 before the drive is over. Other managers as well as those at other points in the county are doing good work. It is found that many people do not fully understand the purpose, magnitude or necessity for this great drive for members in the National Red Cross. Hence this is also a campaign of education, as well as for the benefit of suffering humanity.

Many persons do not seem to understand that this great work is being done voluntarily and that no salaries are paid either to workers or managers in this drive. Again they are positively assured that no salaries are being paid, and that nearly all other expenses are being donated. Out of every dollar contributed to the Red Cross over 98 cents goes to the actual relief of suffering humanity. But comparatively few of the 100,000,000 people in the United States can be soldiers and sailors and Red Cross nurses, none of whom draw excessive salaries, but nearly every person can share in this great work for the relief of suffering.

More reports are coming in today of houses and offices which have enrolled 100 per cent in the Red Cross. Among these, L. B. Moore, Roseburg agent for the S. P. Co., reports that he has secured applications for membership from every man employed in the passenger and freight offices of the company in this city.

Tonight at the Majestic theater Hon. J. J. Booth will speak briefly in behalf of this great membership drive and the work of the Red Cross. Hon. B. L. Kiddy will do like duty at the Antlers. Other speakers will be provided for each evening during this campaign.

Every pastor in the county will speak briefly on Sunday in behalf of the Red Cross, and have been urged to make this a part of their regular services of that date.

KENTUCKY TRAIN WRECK KILLS FORTY SIX PERSONS; NINETEEN WOMEN

SPRINGFIELD, Ky., Dec. 21.—Forty-six persons were killed, including 19 women, and 70 were injured as the result of a Louisville & Nashville passenger train colliding with an accommodation train near here last night. The injured were taken to Louisville on special trains. Officials are investigating the wreck. All on the accommodation train were killed or injured.

ENGLAND IN ACCORD WITH WILSON'S WAR AIMS NO SELFISH DESIRES

LONDON, Dec. 21.—England is in full accord with President Wilson's outline of war aims, that the fight of the world's democracies to victory is not toward a realization of selfish desires. Great Britain seeks no territorial extension but what an international peace conference agrees is necessary to a future peace. Lloyd-George's pledges are unanimously supported.

LOSS PARTLY RECOVERED.

ROME, Dec. 21.—A considerable portion of the German gain of Tuesday, east of Brenno, has been recaptured. The Italians are renewing the offensive at the gateway of the Venetian plains.

NOTED LECTURERS AT STATE MEETING

DR. RICHARD BURTON, OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN, AND PROF. F. M. LEAVITT, OF CHICAGO UNIVERSITY, AMONG THE SPEAKERS

SEVEN TO GO FROM DOUGLAS

Estimated That Two Thousand Oregon Teachers Will Be in Attendance at Oregon State Teachers' Association at Portland

Seven delegates from Douglas County will attend the Oregon State Teachers' Association meeting at Portland, December 27-29. R. G. Hall, of Middle; George W. Schanlin, of Sutherlin; and Miss Maybelle Wilson, of Roseburg, go as delegates from the Douglas County teachers' institute; Mrs. O. C. Brown, teacher in the Roseburg High School, will represent the School Mothers' Club of this county; Supl. O. C. Brown will represent the School Masters' Club; H. Omer Bennett, the Roseburg High School teachers' association, and City Superintendent Aubrey G. Smith, the grade teachers' association of this city.

Superintendent George A. Briscoe, president of the State Teachers' Association, announces that he has secured for the Portland meeting, two of the most noted lecturers in the educational world. Dr. Richard Burton, head of the English department of the University of Minnesota, will deliver two addresses before the general assembly—one on "The Literature of the Great War," and the other on "The Social and Educational Significance of the Theater." Dr. Burton is considered one of the most eloquent and scholarly educators in the United States. The second speaker is Professor Frank M. Leavitt, of the University of Chicago. Professor Leavitt is one of the foremost authorities in the field of industrial education, and largely responsible for the success which has culminated in the Smith Hughes law. His message will be of particular interest to the teachers of Oregon, as the Federal Board has just approved the plans of Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill, chairman of the State Vocational Board, for carrying out the provisions of the Smith Hughes law. This means that Oregon will receive \$15,000 this year from the Federal Government for vocational education.

The first day of the meeting will be taken up by the session of the representative council. There will be approximately 100 delegates present. Every county in the state and the local teachers' association will be represented.

It is expected that not less than two thousand teachers from all over the state will attend the Portland meeting. All of the railroads have granted reduced rates on the certificate plan.

CLOTHING FOR ARMY IS SHORT; TO MAKE CALL FOR BALANCE SOON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—In the face of a startling lack of clothing for thousands of men will be called to the colors by December 21, so Quartermaster General Sharpe admitted to the press. This is the part of the first draft unannounced as yet. He said at present there is not sufficient clothing for the men in training. The American troops were sent to France clad lighter than the French and English by 27 per cent. He advised in favor of the English "Paravoy-General" system to order army ordnance, clothing and food.
