NO NEED FOR ALARM ON ACCOUNT OF CALL FOR LOCOMOTIVES IN EAST

There is no reason for concern on the part of Western shippers at the report that Western railroads have been asked by the Railroad War Board to hold one hundred locomotives in readiness to be turned over to Eastern lines.

By Western railroads is meant all roads in that territory west of the Mississippi, explains McDonald. The requisition is being made on the basis of the number of locomotives owned by each railroad operating in that territory.

It should be borne in mind that the release of these locomotives to Eastern territory is for the purpose of relieving the congestion which is being experienced there that would not be so if the west will be made available for the West and equipment that would otherwise remain in the East.
