CASE FROM DRAIN WAS TRIED BEFORE JUDGE J. W. HAMILTON TODAY

The case of W. C. Edwards, of Drain, against Sam Jones, of the same place, was heard before Judge Hamilton this morning. It was said that Sam Jones gave Mr. Edwards a bond for deed to certain property in Drain, and the bond for deed did not specify which party was to pay the taxes, and each held that the other should have paid them. Mr. Jones had paid the taxes, but held that he should recover the amount from Mr. Edwards on the bond for deed, as he intended that this clause should have been in the instrument.

Late this afternoon Judge Hamilton held that Mr. Jones could not recover the taxes, amounting to \$400, but held that a tender of the balance due on the bond for deed made in 1916, should not hold as the money was not paid into court, and Mr. Edwards is required to pay the interest until payment of the balance.

LOCAL FOOD SURVEY WILL BE MADE SOON

ROSEBURG & DOUGLAS COUNTY MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION RECEIVES NOTICE TO GET READY TO RENDER THEIR REPORT TO OFFICERS.

ALL FOOD DEALERS AFFECTED

Reports Must Tell Quantities On Hand at Present Time, Quantity on Hand a Year Ago and Quantity Now on Way.

H. C. Benson, secretary of the Roseburg and Douglas County Merchants' Association, has received a notice from the food administration authorities asking that he notify all the members of that organization that a food survey of all varieties of food stuffs will be called very soon, and that arrangements should be made to secure the necessary blanks, etc.

This call affects every business that deals in food stuffs of any kind, although not to farmers as producers. The information asked is how much is on hand at the close of this year, how much was on hand at the close of 1916, and how much is en route at this time.

Secretary Benson states that the local organization has subscribed for a service coming from Washington, D. C., which will keep the members well informed as to changes in rules that may be made from time to time, as well as furnish them with copies of all laws and changes in laws relating to food control. Detailed instructions of how to make out the reports mentioned above is also included in the service.

There are at present 67 local firms who are members of the Merchants' Association, and preparations will be made to make a list of all of them. There is a large list of articles included under the survey, which will include all grocers, bakers, mill men, feed dealers, butchers, and prairie packers.

DELIGHTFUL PROGRAM AT HIGH SCHOOL THIS P. M. ORCHESTRA PLAYED WELL
