**MORE MEN ARE CALLED
FOR SPECIAL SERVICE
AT VANCOUVER, JULY 29**

Calls have been issued upon this state for seventy chockermen, fifty head buckers, twenty-four doggers, six general sawmill foremen, and twenty-five planer trimmermen, to be furnished from class one, special and limited service only, to be enlisted for Vancouver Barracks July 29th for engagement in producing spruce for airplanes. Men who are technically qualified under above occupations and who are qualified for general military service may volunteer from classes two, three and four up to and including July 23. If on July 24 a sufficient number of volunteers have not come forth to fill allotments of local boards, the boards will be directed to select a sufficient number of qualified men from within class one (special and limited service only) to fill their allotments, deducting voluntary inductions, in order that these calls may

be allotted in such manner as will produce the required number of technically qualified men with the least disturbance of industrial and agricultural conditions. Boards are requested to advise by telegram immediately the approximate number of men held for special and limited service available under these calls. Only white men are wanted under these calls.
