Parrott and Sutherlin, managers of the Antlers theater, announce that they have secured "Over the Top," the big photoplay version of Sergeant Arthur Guy Empey's famous war book of the same name, to be shown at the Antlers theater on Friday and Saturday, July 19 and 20. **MARINE CORPS OPEN  
TO JUNE REGISTRANTS;  
WINSTON BOY ENLISTS**

Willis Dean Myers, who enlisted here today in the Marine Corps, will leave tomorrow evening for Portland, where he will take the examination before being sent to the receiving station at Mare Island, Cal. Mr. Myers is a son of A. B. Myers, of Winston, and is well known in this vicinity, having lived in Douglas County for the last six years.

The Portland district, including Roseburg, holds the record for leading in the Marine recruiting for the first part of July. During this month more men have been enlisted than in any other division on the Pacific Coast, and during two days 77 men were recruited into the Marine service. All branches of the Marine Corps are now open to young men for enlistment.

Orders received by the local Marine recruiting office and other offices and by the local draft board pertaining to the recent orders of General Crowder, state that all young men who registered on June 4, who are desirous to enter the Marine service and can satisfactorily pass the examination, shall be released by their local boards for this purpose. It is not known how long these orders will be in effect, so all young men considering the Marine Corps should take the opportunity while it is open.

A birthday party in honor of Mrs. S. M. Kelley is to be held at the Kelley home on Roberts Creek this evening. A number of guests have been invited and a very enjoyable time is anticipated.
