WILL INCREASE OPERATIONS.

C. Metc. Johnson has taken over from the Government a large donkey engine which the Government obtained from the Gardiner Mill Co., and is having it removed to the logging camp on the Umpqua below Gardiner. The facilities for getting out logs for the mill will be largely increased, which will furnish logs in sufficient number to keep the mill running steadily, which is cutting now daily about 40,000 feet of square and will shortly be increased to 50,000. Mr. Johnson expects to ship a carload of airplane stock this week besides his other shipments of lumber, which at present is averaging over a carload per day.
