**MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 19.**—W. N. Clark, of the North Bend box factory, today closed a lease for 15 years on the Southern Oregon mill and yard at Empire, where the mill will be reconstructed and placed in shape for service. The deal includes sale of the goods belonging to the Southern Oregon Company, conducted at Empire as a commercial business of groceries and other merchandise. Mr. Clark has associated with him in the venture a number of San Francisco men.

It is expected the mill, when overhauled, will be put on spruce cutting and the operations will necessitate new logging camps.
