LOCAL HAPPENINGS IN THE VICINITY OF MYRTLE CREEK AND CANYONVILLE

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Darden, formerly of Canyonville, left Roseburg on Tuesday evening for Klamath Falls, where they expect to reside indefinitely in hopes of benefiting their health. Mr. and Mrs. Darden have been living in Portland during the last two years, where Mr. Darden was employed in the shipyards.

Bill Rice returned to his home at Myrtle Creek on Tuesday evening after several months spent at Marshfield, where he was building ships. Mr. Rice said that he had helped build several big boats in which to carry soldiers across to whip the Kaiser.

The prune harvest at Myrtle Creek is almost completed and most of the prune drying will be finished by the end of this week. All the prune growers report excellent crops, and although the shortage of prune pickers and help made harvesting more difficult this year than formerly, the crops were taken care of as soon as possible, and thousands of pounds of prunes will be sent in sacks right from the orchards to San Francisco, where they will be loaded on boats to go across to France for the soldiers this winter. Prune harvesting in Orchard Valley and Canyonville is later than at Myrtle Creek, but next week will see it completed at these places.

Mr. and Mrs. D. Loblanc, of Orchard Valley, have received a letter from their son, Alfred Loblanc, who is now on the U. S. S. Powhatan, one of the large transport vessels out of New York. The young man left home in December last and has started on his third trip across the ocean to France. He has been on French soil each trip and has visited all of New York and its suburbs, but he writes, "I don't want to go back to New York, in Brooklyn, Hoboken, New Jersey and New York. The Canyonville and Myrtle Creek Red Cross units have suspended meetings until after the prune harvest, when they will get together and decide upon the work which they will take up this winter. Prunes are all important just at present and all of the Red Cross ladies are busy assisting in the prune harvest.

The raising of sugar cane on the farms between Myrtle Creek and Canyonville has proven very successful this year and several of the farmers will have a large crop of cane to be made into sorghum and thus help in conserving sugar by the use of sorghum as a substitute. It has only been in the last year or two that the farmers have attempted to grow sugar cane, but since it has yielded such satisfactory results it will now be a permanent crop. L. H. Baldwin, of Roseburg, who has a mill for the manufacturing of sorghum molasses, will start next week on the sugar cane crop.

Henry Weaver, of Myrtle Creek, is planning to leave soon for Montana, where he will spend several months. Mr. Weaver has been in poor health lately and he thinks that the climate in Montana will be of much benefit to him.
