GERMAN REPLY CROOKED.
(Continued from Page One.)

with the German government until
Germany surrenders.

Huns Still Fighting Fiercely.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The
Americans north of Verdun on Sun-
day continued their pressure against
the pivot point upon which the Ger-
man retreat is swinging, so General
Pershing reported. His report said:

"West of the Meuse River the
Americans continue their pressure on
the enemy. East of Bantheville dur-
ing local fighting in the Bois-Des-
Rapettes they captured over 100 pris-
oners. On the entire front north-
ward of Verdun there was heavy ar-
tillery action and machine gunning.
Severe counter attacks were thrown
back with heavy loss to the enemy.
During the heavy fighting of the

past week north of Verdun we have
caused the enemy to draw from
other parts of the western front a
constantly increasing number of
German divisions who are bitterly
contesting every foot of ground
against our strong attack, thus hop-
ing to secure the safe retreat of the
German army, the position of which
has been compromised by allied at-
tacks from the south and west."

OBITUARY.

Lee J. Reding, beloved son of Mr.
and Mrs. John H. Reding, of Dilard,
died in his country's service, last
Tuesday, October 15th, at Fort Mc-
Dowell, Angel Island, California.
Mr. Reding was stricken shortly af-
ter his arrival at Fort McDowell
with Spanish influenza, which de-
veloped almost immediately into
pneumonia. The young man was a
member of the 12th Company, U. S.,
stationed at East Barracks. He was
21 years old, having been born in
Joplin, Missouri, on June 6, 1887.

Besides his parents, he is survived
by a twin brother, D. M. Reding,
who arrived in Dilard from Glen-
dale, Oregon, where he is employed
in a Government logging camp, in
time to attend the funeral.

Mr. Reding had resided in Dilard
for the last seven years and was
widely known as a man of sterling
character. His loss is deeply
mourned by a host of friends in this
community. The funeral was held
in this city last Friday at the Masonic
cemetery, the services being con-
ducted by the Eagles lodge. X
