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MAKING THE WORLD SAFE FROM WAR.

After having been the leading factor in bringing the great war to a close nearly a year sooner than was generally deemed possible, President Wilson is today landing in France with a view to securing the adoption of peace terms which will practically free the world from the probability that such a terrible conflict will ever occur again. In him is mainly centered the hope of nearly all the nations involved, that this can be accomplished. This is a matter of such tremendous importance to the peace, prosperity and future happiness of the world that with one accord the allied and enemy nations have urged or desired his presence at the peace conference. It is generally conceded that he goes with a breadth of vision and a clearness of insight that is well-nigh impossible in the nations of Europe, with their centuries of intrigue and conquest. All realize that America seeks nothing out of this most terrible war except the adoption of such peace terms as will make future wars practically impossible. This is the ideal which President Wilson represents and the object which he undoubtedly seeks to attain. To free the world from war is perhaps the most exalted service to humanity to which anyone can now aspire. If it were only a matter of bargaining over the exact relocation of certain national boundaries in Europe, or the question of a few billions, more or less, to be exacted by the several nations involved, in a stupendous grab game, it is safe to say that President Wilson would not have crossed the ocean at this time. While the matter of boundaries and reparation for destruction wrought are important, and he is anxious that justice be done to all, yet it will doubtless be shown within the next few weeks that his mission is one of much greater importance. Among his purposes, as will doubtless be demonstrated, will be to prevent, if possible, that species of sharp bargaining which has characterized peace conferences in bygone years and former centuries. It was such scheming and arbitrary methods that have always resulted sooner or later in other wars. To avoid a recurrence of this fateful outcome is doubtless one of the great objects of the President in attending this present peace conference.

With such an important and desirable object as this, and asking nothing whatever for ourselves, it would seem that the President should have the unanimous support of his countrymen. Yet there are in America a number of blatant politicians, and some no-called newspapers, who are so despicably narrow minded and so rankly partisan that they are continually hounding the President, no matter what he does. They evidently fail to realize that the President's object now is to save for humanity what has been won in this great war at the sacrifice of millions of lives and billions of treasure. That the prime object for which we have fought and sacrificed will have been lost unless such peace terms are adopted as will prevent a recurrence of war a few years or a generation hence.

That President Wilson is working ardently for this exalted purpose, for the benefit and freedom of humanity, and the deliverance of the world from the horrors of war, is evidently beyond the comprehension of his defamers. They go on persistently with their continual knock, knock, knock, although aside from a possible petty partisan advantage not one of them can tell what they can expect to gain thereby, nor how this country, or its allies would be benefitted by his downfall, which seems to be their ultimate object.

It is by no means forgotten that only a few weeks ago these same politicians and their "no toe" newspaper organs were appealing to the voters to elect a Republican Congress in order to give President Wilson stronger support than was hitherto afforded him. No sooner was a Republican Congress elected than those hypocritical politicians and their intelligences began what seems to be the most systematic series of attacks ever launched against a chief executive. He is being criticized and abused and lied, and resolutions have even been offered in the Senate for declaring his office vacant when he pronounced his intention of attending the peace conference, although that assemblage will be one of the most important in the world's history. Upon its outcome rests the probability of world peace for many generations to come, or the possibility of other wars which will again drench the earth with blood and slaughter. It is for the former that the President is striving, and in this he will have the support of every true American. Those who pretended to support the President before the election but are openly fighting him now are only demonstrating how villainously they lied then in order to gain a partisan advantage. Such despicable treachery should only be characteristic of a Hun, and any person or publication who practices it is not worthy of the respect or consideration of honorable citizens. In reality it should place them in the class of modern Judases. Betrayers of the voters' political gain, as shown by their pre-election pretenses, they are now endeavoring to tear down the man who is acknowledged by the nations of the world as the leading exponent on earth today of humanity and world freedom.

After two months of belated temporizing, Portland, Albany, Eugene and other Willamette Valley towns are at last putting into effect a strict individual quarantine against cases of influenza. The great wonder is, why this was not done at the very beginning. If there were a dozen cases of smallpox or scarlet fever in any of these towns the individual quarantine would have been dropped on immediately—losed and fast. Then everyone else would have gone about their daily affairs as usual, secure in the knowledge that the infection would not spread. Yet it seems to have taken two months, and probably a number of deaths, to convince the health authorities that it was time to take similar measures against the "flu." If a strict quarantine of the individual cases had been put into effect from the beginning, the malady would have died out long before now. A strict quarantine and isolation of every case will quickly put an end to the infection. Any health board which fails to do this, or see that it is done, is lax in its duty to the public.

WHAT HAVE WE WON?

Four Minute Speech by S. C. Hartman:

When this war threw the search-
light on our National life it revealed
to us conditions of an unbelievable
nature existing in our commercial
and industrial life, in our educational
institutions, and in fact in almost
every vocation.

In our mad rush and race for
fortune and success we have overlooked
the subtle influences that have been
working in our midst. We never
appreciated until the truth was
forced upon us that we were uncon-
sciously becoming the tools of a for-
eign policy under an insidious propa-
ganda. We were drifting or rather
being led toward foreign ideals in
music, art, science and the higher
education.

That most attractive, innocent ap-
pearing but subtle and destructive
German Bolshevism has been, thru
an insidious foreign propaganda, in-
oculated into the minds of a certain
element in this country, forming a
medium for active operation. Its
adherents have thrown a circle
around themselves and excluded
everything American. Its pernicious
influence has been eating into the
very vitals of our industrial life, cre-
ating strife and hatred between
those factors that should in wisdom
be co-ordinating their mutual inter-
ests for the benefit of themselves
and the public welfare.

Under the freedom of our laws
our foreign population has in the
past been allowed unhampered and
at its own discretion to fraternize in
distinctive groups throughout the
land and to exercise at its will for-
eign thought, foreign language and
foreign ideals. This has not been
conducive to good American citizen-
ship and American patriotism.

This war has taught the American
people that from this time on this
must be stopped and instead they
must accept and cherish American
loyalty, American thought and
American ideals. As certain as the
sun, this will be done, for the
two millions or more returning re-
d-blooded American soldiers who have
been in direct contact with these
causes and who will in the near fu-

SPANISH INFLUENZA--THE WAY TO TREAT IT AND TO AVOID IT

Simply the Old-Fashioned Grip Mas-
querading Under a New Name.

Spanish Influenza, which appeared
in Spain in May, has all the appear-
ance of grip or la grippe, which has
swept over the world in numerous
epidemics as far back as history
runs. Hippocrates refers to an epi-
demic in 212 B. C., which is regard-
ed by many to have been influenza.
Every century has had its attacks.
Beginning with 1851, this country
has had five epidemics, the last in
1889-90.

There is no occasion for pan-
ic. Influenza or grip has a very low per-
centage of fatalities—not over one
death out of every four hundred
cases, according to the N. C. Board
of Health. The chief danger lies in
complications arising, attacking prin-
cipally patients in a run-down condi-
tion—those who don't go to bed
soon enough, or those who get up too
early.

THE TREATMENT.

Go to bed at the first symptoms,
not only for your own sake but to
avoid spreading the disease to
others—take a purgative, eat plenty
of nourishing food, remain perfectly
quiet and don't worry. Nature her-
self is the only "cure" for influenza
and will throw off the attack if
only you conserve your strength. A
little Quinine, Aspirin or Iodo-
quin may be given by the physi-
cian's directions to allay the aching.
Always call a physician, since the
chief danger of grip is in its weak-
ening effect on the system, which
allows complications to develop.
These are chiefly pneumonia and
bronchitis, sometimes inflammation
of the middle ear, or heart affec-
tions. For these reasons, it is very
important that the patient remain
in bed until his strength returns—
stay in bed at least two days or more
after the fever has left you, or if you
feel.

Assume largely the responsibility
and reign of our country will
insure this improved condition.

We have, therefore, won from this
war a higher standard of citizen-
ship, a broader and more compre-
hensive understanding of our al-
liance to our flag and to our coun-
try.
