REEDSPORT GROWS RAPIDLY. INCORPORATION PROPOSED.

(Oregon Journal.) REEDSPORT, March 15.—Without any or town organization and without a jail, policeman, constable, deputy sheriff, justice of the peace or cemetery, Reedport, located on the lower Umpqua River and on the coast line of the Southern Pacific Railroad, has attained a population of 500 people. The residents of the rapidly growing place have concluded that they need a regular city government and have taken steps to incorporate as a city. The necessary petitions have been circulated and freely signed and application for incorporation will be made and a special election held. There seems no doubt that the proposition to incorporate will carry. Reedport has been making rapid strides during the past few months and the incorporation as a city has come as a natural consequence. The advantages of a city are noted. Two lumber mills, the Johnson mill and the Reedport Lumber Co. mill are in operation at Reedport, and a third mill, owned by the Winchester Bay Lumber Company, is being constructed. This, when finished, will be a large plant, which will cut 125,000 feet of lumber a day. An option has been given for the purchase of an island opposite Reedport in the Umpqua river to a lumber company, which has erected a large plant, and negotiations are being closed for still another lumber industry. Up to this time Reedport has

been lighted by gasoline lamps, but ever before the incorporation is perfected electricity will light the place. An electric company has been organized and incorporated as the Reedport Light & Power Company, and will at once install a plant at the Johnson mill, where steam from the mill can be used. J. Mox, Johnson is president, John R. Browne secretary, and W. P. Reed and Clyde Chase of Reedport, and J. E. Staples of Portland are the directors. Fishing is one of the big industries of the Reedport district. The Reedport Fish Company last year shipped a million and a half pounds of fresh fish in ice to the large cities, much of the product going to New York. This year the output of the company will be much larger as, in addition to the hundred or more fishermen on the river, two boats will fish in the ocean starting the catch to Reedport for packing and shipping. G. J. Armstrong, of Marshfield, has taken over the ocean-going boat Waterwitch, which he will operate, and a 60-ton (gross) motor boat from the Columbia River will begin in April fishing outside for the company. A salmon cannery is also operated in Reedport and the catching of salmon has been successfully tried out and promises to be an enormous industry for that place during the coming year. The First Bank of Reedport, with a capitalization of \$25,000, was started last month and opened in temporary quarters. The deposits have been increasing at the rate of \$10,000 a week since the bank opened. Formerly the nearest bank was at Gardiner. Work has been started on a frame two-story structure for the bank. On the lower floor will be fine quarters for the bank and a store room, and on the second floor two five-room apartments. The bank is now occupying temporary quarters. A new theater is being built by I. E. Staples, of Portland, 40x80 in size. The theater will be fitted with opera chairs and will have a seating capacity of 100. Plans have been perfected for a new school house for Reedport, which will cost \$15000. It will be on the north end of the city and will contain four school rooms, arranged in front of additions. Two teachers will be in charge of the school. The Reedport Construction Company has completed 10 new cottages, fitted with all modern conveniences, and will at once start the erection of 10 more, which will be rented or sold. Warren P. Reed, who started the town of Reedport, has moved his home from Gardiner to this place and will build a handsome residence. Reed, Janell & Co. have started remodeling their store, building to fit the second floor for a dance and entertainment hall. J. C. Allen, of San Francisco, a former resident of Gardiner, has started driving piling for the foundation of a store building. In one room he will open a retail business and the other will be rented. The Emporia Hotel, which was completed a few months ago, has proved too small to meet the demands of the patronage, and another story will be added. A large workshop has been erected in the business section by a firm which will engage in building and repairing fishing boats and other small craft. Delicious home-made pastry at the Cafeteria.
