**DON'T PROCASTINATE.**

The drive for the American and Syrian relief fund ends on Saturday evening, March 23, 1919, and there has been no response to the call for volunteers to canvass Roseburg. That now is the biggest cause of the American in spite of that fact, however, we should give something and give now to relieve their present distress and suffering.

Therefore, now is the time for those who have not yet in their contributions to do so before it is too late.

With patriotic pride let it be said that Bonnie County has headed the largest appeal for these starving people, and that she has again gone over the top.

announcement in order to come over, but will when I get back I'll have nothing to distinguish me from the fellow who tried his best to keep from "crossing the road." That's the opinion of all the boys I have talked to. But although I am still a bunk private, I have the consolation of knowing I didn't go to an officers' training camp in case that the war would be over before I would have to come across. I imagine, judging from the way I have "slipped in and out" in the past, that it would be a good idea to don civilian clothes just as soon as I am discharged and, consequently, as no one would know I had been serving my country, I wouldn't be charged double or triple prices for everything I bought. I notice some papers criticize the soldiers for spending all the money they have, some insurance which only amounts to \$5 or \$7 a month, but undoubtedly they don't realize that soldiers are taxed, generally, two to ten times the prices charged civilians, and especially so over here. Therefore if one buys something to eat as a diversion from the dreary army grub and happens to be a soldier he generally is "broken" before he pays.

I have no idea when we will sail for home, but from what we can learn it will be at least a couple of months yet—probably some time between May 1 and January, 1920, so if you have any spare time for letter writing, kindly start one or two of them in this direction.
