A GUN EXPLODES; MAN WAS INJURED

JOE CAMPBELL, AGED 61, A COFFEE CREEK MINER, SERIOUSLY WOUND BY BURSTING OF STEEL FROM RUSTING GUN STRIKES HIM IN HEAD.

The bursting of a rifle in the hands of Charles Holmes, aged 16, seriously injured Joe Campbell, aged 61, and a widely known Coffee Creek miner, who was brought here last night and admitted to Mercy hospital suffering from a severe wound in the head.
Ed Lough, who rushed the injured man to this city by automobile, stated today that young Holmes, an orphan lad who was making his home with Mr. Campbell, found an old 30-40 rifle about the house and loading several cartridges with black powder the lad retired to the front yard "try out" the weapon. Placing the barrel along the edge of a cedar press, the boy pulled the trigger, and with a loud detonation the gun exploded. A piece of the breach about three inches in length and quite thick, flying like a shot, passed through a window pane, striking Mr. Campbell, who was in a stooping position in the act of washing dishes. He was hit under the right eye. Ranging downward the steel slug passed through the nostril and lodged in the roof of the mouth, inflicting a most painful and ghastly wound. Neighbors hearing the shot rushed to the scene and were horrified to find Mr. Campbell lying on the floor in a pool of his own blood, a gruesome hole in his head. A stretcher was immediately improvised, a doctor phoned for and the injured man was made as comfortable as possible for the four miles that must be traveled over a mountain trail to the vicinity of Tillamook, where Mr. Lough was waiting with an automobile.

INFLECTED A GHASTLY WOUND

Charles Holmes Overloads Cartridges Injured Man Was Brought to This City and Taken to Mercy Hospital for Treatment.

The unfortunate accident occurred at about 8:30 Sunday morning and by the time the injured man reached his city at 5:30 yesterday evening he was exceedingly weak from the loss of blood. It is feared that his wound, complicated by general ill health, is a bad one.
Strangely enough, young Holmes was practically uninjured. However, the explosion was so terrific that he was knocked down and rendered unconscious for a time. When he came to he was sitting on the porch of the Campbell home and remembered nothing of what had transpired.
Mr. Campbell has resided in the Coffee Creek vicinity for the past 30 years, where he has been engaged in mining. So far as known he has no relatives.
