**CHAUTAQUA AT OAKLAND.**

Oakland is getting ready for the best Chautauqua that we have ever had. **WORLD'S CHAMPION HERE.**

That the world's champion Jersey is an Oregon cow appears from the official record of the American Jersey Cattle Club, just issued. The splendid cow is Vire la France, owned by Richard Brown, in Marion County.  
During the year ending March 24, 1915, she produced as follows:  
Milk production.....14,925 lbs.  
Fat production.....1,632 lbs.  
Average butter fat.....6.91%  
Think of it—24 tons of milk pulled out of one little cow in one year, and that milk so rich that it yielded more than a ton of butter fat. Well may Oregon be proud of such a wonderful animal.  
A Jersey Jubilee will be held at O. A. C., May 20-25. All Oregon should attend, jubilate and honor our dairymen and their wonderful animals.

would have been killed, but as it was, though badly bruised, Mr. Elliott was able to come to town the next day.
