TENNESSEE BOY IS GREATEST HERO

SERGEANT YORK, THE RED-HEADED CHURCH ELDER AND CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTOR, PERFORMS WONDERFUL SINGLE-HANDED FEAT.

25 MACHINE GUNS SILENCED

He Wears the Congressional Medal of Honor and the Croix de Guerre—Home State Gives Him a Cattle Ranch.

NEW YORK, June 6. — Sergeant Alvin C. York is a redhead. His neck is red and crimsoned with sun-baked furrows. His ears are red and prominent. His regular featured face is red, too, so that by contrast his eyebrows and lashes are white. But his eyes are blue and deep-set with a hawk-like quality. Without his No. 11½ doughboy shoes he is more than six feet tall.

On October 8, near Chateau Chabery, in the Argonne forest, Sergeant York killed 25 Germans, captured 132 others, including a major and three lieutenants, and put out of action 35 machine guns. When this man, on November 14, 1917, left Pall Mall, Tennessee, where he is a second older in the Church of Christ and Christian Union, he was a conscientious objector. When he landed in Hoboken lately from the transport Obispo he was wearing the congressional medal of honor and a croix de guerre with palm, that had been pinned to the wrinkled breast of his olive drab tunic by Marshal Ferdinand Foch himself.

Fight to Carry Dummies.

Besides Sergeant York there landed in the port of New York yesterday 27,295 other soldiers of the American expeditionary force, but while all the others went into quarantine and through the usual mill, Sergeant York was greeted at the dock in Hoboken by a reception committee of the Tennessee Society of New York with a special luncheon for the adjutant general in Washington granting him five days' leave in New York. For a little half hour this Tennessee hill country blacksmith was the vortex of a swarm of photographers, reporters, movie camera men and members of the reception committee, all of these last fighting for the privilege of carrying some part of the dummies that Sergeant York had carried on his flat shoulders for many a weary mile in French mud.

"Assisted" Into Auto.

Then he was assisted (which made him chuckle) into a big automobile and ferried to New York and thence to the Waldorf Astoria. Two bell-boys fought for the honor of carrying his blanket roll, trench helmet and pack into the hotel. Oscar Tinkley, the manager, has granted Indian privileges with far less warmth than was the portion of Sergeant York today. Oscar waved off a clerk who presented the register for the sergeant's signature. He could register in his suite, the one adjoining the suite reserved for the president of the United States. Then Oscar led the way, using his own party form to batter a path through the ladders in Peacock alley. It was Oscar who held the gate of an elevator until the sergeant and all his retinue of bellboys and reception committee were inside, and again it was Oscar who clapped his hands for maid servants to unlock the doors of Sergeant York's suite.

The sergeant entered a room with two windows, a desk, a bed, a chest with heavy drawers, upholstered furniture and with a gilded piano gleaming in a corner. He took off his overseas cap and looked for a stall on which to hang it. Then he laid it down on the edge of a divan.

Sees Picture of Mother.

E. A. Kellie, manager of the Babers' and Comforters' company, Inc., and a member of the Tennessee society reception committee, turned toward the soldier a silver picture frame standing on a table. The red-headed man looked at the sweet-faced old lady whose photograph (like some sized back at him. Then he said:

"That's the first picture I've seen of my mother in several days." Several days meant about 18 months, for York then explained that he had not carried pictures of his kin folks overseas. "I'd rather leave 'em home than in the trenches," he said.

When from tonight Sergeant York goes to bed. In fact he went to two beds, for because of his long limbs it struck his fancy to sleep obliquely on

the twin brass beds in his suite.

Considering Entering Ministry.
Sergeant York said he was considering entering the ministry, but had not yet determined on his future.

Discussing the report that he was a conscientious objector, he said: "I was out on the field at Camp Upton when a letter was received from my pastor saying that I was a conscientious objector. I was not. I don't approve of taking human life unless it is necessary, but I considered it necessary when my colonel and my captain explained that the fight was for democracy, the peace of the world and for humanity. Then I determined to fight."

York had little to say about the feat which won him the highest honor medal his country could bestow.

I kept my automatic in my right hand all the time and my rifle in my left, and kept on firing," he said.

PALL MALL, Tenn., June 8. — Sergeant Alvin C. York, hero of the Argonne, was married here Saturday to Miss Grace Williams, his childhood sweetheart. The ceremony, conducted by Governor Roberts of Tennessee, was in an open-air amphitheater on the York farm, before 3000 of his mountain neighbors, many army comrades and visitors who had traveled long distances. Sergeant York wore a colonel's uniform, in accordance with the title conferred upon him since his return by Governor Roberts.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 8. — Sergeant Alvin C. York of Pall Mall, Tenn., "the war's greatest hero," is proud of his red head, "because he got it honestly," and for that reason he has accepted a membership in the Clemmer Red Head club of Spokane, according to telegrams received here today.

Dr. Howard S. Clemmer, president of the club, has sent Sergeant York a membership certificate bearing the inscription "conferred upon Sergeant Alvin C. York by virtue of the color of his hair and in recognition of his services to this our glorious country."

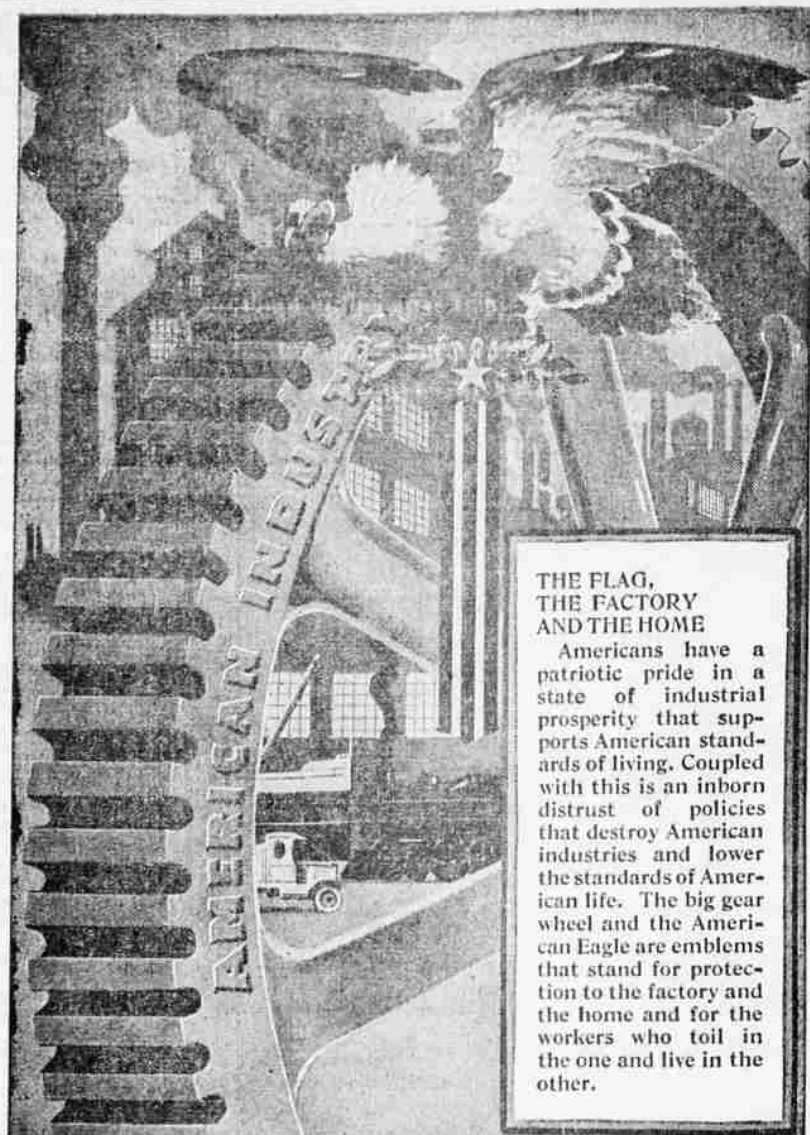
