QUARRY ROBBERY ON MONDAY NIGHT

FOUR MEN ROBBED PETE TRAVICH OF ABOUT \$1900 WHICH THE LATTER HAD THE HABIT OF CARRYING ABOUT WITH HIM.

TRIED TO CUT COMMUNICATION

Turned All Boats Loose at the Quarry—Two of Robbers Were Wounded by posse at Scottsburg—All Were Captured.

(Port Umpqua Courier.)

Pete Travich, an employe of the rock quarry near Brandy Bar on the Umpqua River about six miles below Scottsburg, was held up at the quarry Monday morning about 2 o'clock by three men who carefully planned the job, taking from Travich about \$1900, which he was in the habit of carrying around with him.

It appears that four parties were interested in the robbery directly and indirectly, the leader of the gang being one Mike Zelock, a Greek, who had been employed at the quarry up to about the first of May, when he quit work there and left. While there he carefully planned the job, taking from Travich about \$1900, which he was in the habit of carrying around with him.

Such no money was found upon him which led the officers at first to think that others must have the \$1900, or that Zelock the wounded man, had hidden it somewhere. In the meantime the queer actions of one of the deputies appointed by Justice Andrews, Kriam by name, who was seen at the place of the shooting to stop and pick up some article, which afterwards proved to have been the money. Finally the man was taken into custody and, upon examination and search being made of his room, over \$500 was found on him and in his room, a big part of it being found hidden in a camera which he had in possession the day after the robbery. Up to the time of the present writing, \$900 has been recovered, and it is thought that Kriam has hidden the remainder in some other location. This man Kriam at one time worked in this city for the Winchester Bay Lumber Co., but little is known of him. Dr. Eastland says that the injured man will recover from his injuries, and that he will be able to sit down to a meal.

Zelock expressed himself as being very indignant at the posse all shooting at him, stating that he would not have treated even a dog in that manner. He may get over his indignation before he has opportunity again to rob another man. The owner of the auto which brought the parties who did the robbing to Scottsburg, claims to be innocent, stating that he was hired in Portland to bring them to Brandy Bar and Scottsburg, and that they were to pay him so much an hour for the trip, but nevertheless all parties are now in custody and probably new developments will appear.

Many rumors are afloat concerning the robbery, and old story Scottsburg was never so rudely awakened since the "days of old and the days of gold" as it was last Monday, and many rumors will pass before the incident will be forgotten and the story ceased to be told and retold of how "we caught the robbers of 'Brandy Bar Quarry'."

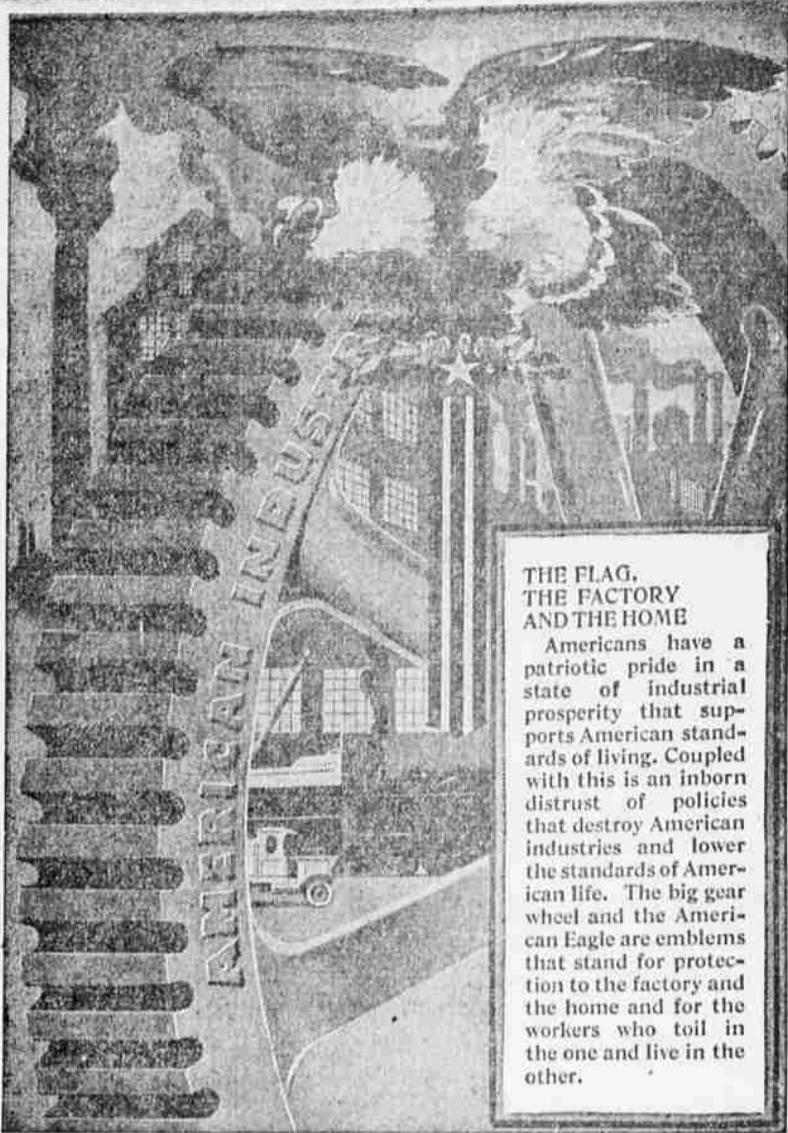

Sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Douglas County, Ore., at courthouse, Roseburg, Ore., at 2 o'clock p. m., on the 12th day of July, 1916, for graveling a section of road between the post office of Dixonville and the post office of Pool, Douglas County, Oregon. The work involves approximately 2.25 miles of graveling, the limits being more particularly described as from Engineer's Station 0+00, which bears S. 89 degrees 28 minutes W. 1874 feet from the N. W. corner of the White D. L. C. No. 45, to 27+4, to Engineer's Station 122+00.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond or certified check for an amount equal to at least five (5) per cent of the total amount of the bid. Shortly after taking their stations a boat was heard coming up the river, but it did not attempt to land at the wharf, but proceeded up the river on the opposite side and attempted to make a landing above the gravel bar a short distance above the wharf, but owing to the low tide they were unable to do so, causing the occupants of the boat to land at a different point than was their intention. Two of the robbers fell over the bank and, as the posse approached, groans were heard and, on inspection, Mike Zelock was found to be wounded, but the other two had made their escape.
