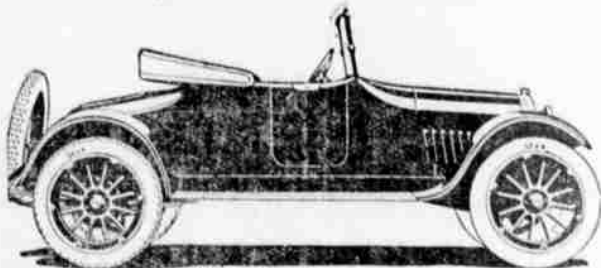

UMPQUA POST IS URGED PLANT TREES

Chamber of Commerce Sec'y Writes to Ex-Service Men For Assistance

TO ACT AS MEMORIAL

Plans to Plant Row of Trees Along the Pacific Highway in Douglas County As a Tribute to the U. S. Forces.

Owing to the limited funds in the treasury, Umpqua post of the American Legion will probably be unable to handle the proposition suggested to them by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce in the matter of planting trees along the Pacific highway in Douglas county as a memorial to the boys who wore Uncle Sam's fighting togs. Although the legion realizes the fact that such a memorial would be a most fitting and lasting one, they cannot see their way clear at this time to take definite action. An effort will be made by the Chamber of Commerce, according to C. S. Heintz, to have the county court assist and co-operate with the legion, the citizens of Roseburg, the merchants' association and the Chamber of Commerce and thereby beautify the stretch of highway traversing Douglas county for such a distance.

Opportunity to help beautify the country in roadside tree planting is offered the memorial now that millions are to be spent in road building by the various states. The American Forestry association has recently from every section of the country showing that its call to make our highways "roads of remembrance" has been taken up. This roadside planting of memorial trees answers a manifold purpose. The result will be a country-wide memorial to the men who answered their country's call. The American Forestry association urges that in the building of roads, plans for the eraser planting of trees be included. The roads of Europe are famous for this very thing, the association says, and it wants to see such improvement in this country.

To the district commissioners (Washington, D. C.) the association has urged the planting of memorial trees along each street, and three help to make it one of the famous streets of the world. These trees would be named in honor of the men of the district who served their country during the war. There is another fine opportunity for memorial tree planting, the association points out, in completing the grounds about the Lincoln memorial. Tree planting along roads and drives is the plan of many communities, and the memorial will be the one to reap the greatest benefit.

REVIVAL SERVICE STARTS

The revival services began at the Christian church last night with an audience that completely filled the main auditorium. The meeting opened with plenty of "pop" and indicated a fine interest from the beginning. Evangelist Cross proved himself to be an attractive speaker. He speaks without notes of any kind and is full of life and activity. He held his audience throughout, and at times laughing uproariously. He believes in the gospel of smile, and is full of clean fun. Mr. Cross is a 23rd degree Mason, and has been a railroad man in his early life, and believes in mingling with people in a social way. His first sermon set forth the principles governing his meetings, and what should really be done in bringing the best success. A large chorus choir was present, and will be greatly augmented. Mr. Cross led his own music, and Mrs. Cross does the solo work, although she was unable to be present last night.

At the close of service a reception was held. Three booths had been erected. The Christian Endeavor had one decorated in their colors with a large electrically lighted C. E. in the center. The Bible school had one boasting the Bible school, and especially the Easter service, and gave way small souvenirs. The ladies of the church had a third beautifully decorated. Service was rendered from each of these booths, and it was an enjoyable occasion. The service will continue tonight, and evangelist Cross will speak on "The Prevailing Church." Large plans are being laid for Easter, and the Bible school sets its mark for 1920.

WILL TAKE OVER COURT

The Christian Church Tennis Club which for a number of years has had the lease on the excellent court at the Moore property on Washington street, have renewed their lease and are preparing to make a number of improvements to the grounds. A cross killing preparation will be put on the surface in order to kill the vegetation which is now growing up on the court and the surface will otherwise be put in good condition for the season's play. The club will be composed of about thirty members all of whom are amateur players.
