

Looting of Freight Trains in Austria

VIENNA, April 1.—Looting of freight trains particularly of foodstuffs and wearing apparel goes on unchecked throughout Austria. Unless conveyed, it is said, a shipment stands little chance of coming thru intact. The robbers seem well organized and armed and often so numerous as to resist arrest.

Gift cargoes from other European states mean the favorite plunder and, according to report, much of the stolen goods has been found for sale in the open market.

A large consignment of this character from Sweden arrived this week and when the well arranged food parcels, containing flour, fats and other staples, were opened it was found that a portion of the fat and flour has been skillfully removed from each package and a sack of Austrian salt substituted to make up the requisite weight.

WASTE IS REDUCED

AUSTIN, Texas, April 1.—The waste of natural gas in Texas, which at one time amounted to 300,000 cubic feet, or the fuel equivalent of 24,000 tons of coal per day, has been reduced until there is no considerable waste, according to a statement from the oil and gas division of the Texas railroad commission.

The statement said in part: "The railroad commission gives credit for this happy condition largely to the operators, who have shown such a splendid spirit of co-operation, especially so when there is so little market for gas as at present, and where, in many cases, if the wells were allowed to blow, they might come in as good oil producers."

ADOPTS WAR ORPHANS.

NEW YORK, April 1.—Miss Margaret Wilson, eldest daughter of the president, has "adopted" two Serbian war orphans, a boy and a girl, whose father was killed in battle in 1914, according to Miss Slavko Grouitch, wife of the Jugo-Slav minister at Washington, and director of the Serbian aid fund. The children will continue, however, it was said, to live with their mother at Negotin, Serbia, which is near the Rumanian border. Miss Grouitch is now seeking other godmothers and aid for Serbian children in a tour of Texas and Oklahoma.

PLANES DELIVER MAIL.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 1.—Earl ythia summer hydroplanes will provide the Stewart mining camp all the comforts of a rural mail delivery and will deliver from the southern markets every thing from produce to lumber. Several machines are now being constructed in Seattle and early next month the first one will fly to Stewart.

Wilson Defends the Statut Yank Troops

WASHINGTON, Apr. 1.—The American troops in the territory they control still are governed by the terms of the armistice, the president said. He disclosed that the American government has disapproved of the plans to have the troops and territory placed under orders of the Rhineland high commission. Marshall Poch has no authority over the American troops the president said. Major General Allen commanding the forces, "has full power to authorize and utilize his troops for police and to repel any attack which may be made upon him," the executive added.
