OLDEST SOLDIER IN WORLD WAR

GREAT FALLS, Mont., April 3.—Yule claims to have been the oldest soldier in the great war. He enlisted in the Canadian army at the age of 79, he declares, and served three years in Scotland and France as a non-commissioned officer. He says he will be 76 years of age next month, but is said not to look more than 60. When enlisting, Yule claims, he gave his age as 42 and a Canadian recruiter passed him without comment. Yule enlisted at Prince Rupert, B. C., and went overseas with a Canadian forestry division. He spent a service period saving wood with forestry battalions.

GOVERNMENT CONGRATULATES HAPPY FATHERS IN S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—Every happy father of a new born boy or girl in San Francisco nowadays gets a letter from the government congratulating him and his wife. The first paragraph of the letter reads: "The government of the United States is vitally interested in the fact that you and your wife have been blessed with the advent of a child. This government is the society of American people, and it is fitting that it should be interested in its new members."

The letter of congratulation goes on to point out to the proud father his new responsibilities as the moulder of an American citizen, stressing the importance of education and appealing to him to secure the education of his child by beginning the systematic weekly purchase of war savings stamps. One war saving stamp a week, the letter states, will amount to \$1,179.36 in five years.

Returns indicate that many parents have enthusiastically adopted the idea and banks and post offices have been asked to co-operate closely in keeping interest stimulated in the proposition.

LIBERTY BOND OWNERS RELIEVED OF EXPENSE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—Holders of temporary Liberty loan bonds will be relieved of any expenses in connection with the exchange of their temporary bonds for the permanent securities, according to an announcement made by the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco. The exchange will be carried on through the banks and trust companies of the twelfth federal reserve district. Transportation and insurance charges on the return of the temporary bonds to the Federal Reserve bank and shipments of the permanent bonds to individual banks will be paid by the government.

Where, however, a bond holder elects to deal directly with the Federal Reserve bank, he or she will have to pay transportation charges. Assistant Secretary of the Treasury R. C. Leffingwell, in an appeal to the banks to handle the exchange of bonds, expressed confidence that the banking houses of the country would forego the collection of fees and thus complete "their patriotic service in connection with war loans by carrying out this last and, mechanically, the largest operation related to our war financing without imposing charges for their own services. Holders of temporary bonds will, it is hoped, consult their own banks and avail themselves of their assistance in effecting exchanges for permanent bonds."

The Federal Reserve bank will announce later the date on which the exchange will begin.

AMERICAN CITIZENS MUST SUPPORT SCHOOLS

"American citizens must support the public schools," says Supt. O. C. Brower. "Every man and woman in the state of Oregon who is a loyal American citizen should support the two-mill tax for the elementary schools at the May primaries. The Americanization of our people depends to a large extent upon the elementary schools. These schools are in great need of more money at the present time or their efficiency will be greatly jeopardized. Why? Because teachers cannot teach for the night."

NO NAIL SHORTAGE

PITTSBURG, April 1.—By increasing the production of nails 15 per cent, steel mills in the Pittsburgh district have eliminated fear of a shortage. Building booms in New York, Chicago, Detroit and a number of other cities have drawn heavily upon the supply of nails on hand, and builders had begun to fear for the immediate future of their work. Pittsburgh contractors took up the question with the mills, and full speed ahead was ordered, with the result that production soon overtook consumption, and authorities now say there is enough nails for all building projects in sight.
