## WARSAW HUMMING WITH ACTIVITY

Crowded to Its Doors With Poverty Stricken Refugees of the War.

## POPULATION ENORMOUS

Reports Say It is the Most Crowded City in Eastern Europe—Basements Used as Sleeping Quarters by Many.

WARSAW, March 19.—(By Mail).—Warsaw is humming with war activity and is crowded to its very doors with hordes of poverty-stricken refugees from the areas for which the Poles and Bolsheviks are fighting. Travelers say it is the most crowded city in eastern Europe. The population is estimated to have increased from 800,000 to 1,200,000 since the world war began.

Everywhere there are officers and soldiers. Military automobiles, tractors and various other vehicles of war traverse the streets all day and most of the night. The cafe life is as bright and gay as ever, but the restaurants and theaters close at 10 p. m. to save food, light and labor. The refugees from the war-stricken areas began streaming into the city about a year ago, and have been coming ever since, hoping to find food and places to sleep. The problem of providing for them has baffled the city officials.

In the poorer districts, basements, which for generations were used for storage purposes have been used for refugees' sleeping quarters. In instances 15 to 20 persons, and even more, sleep on a basement floor, on straw. Others have found shelter in stables or in buildings intended for schools. Many of these refugees are women, with children, who have come out of the east virtually without funds. During the way these people are partly supplied with food by the municipality or some of the welfare organizations. Many exist only by begging.

Warsaw's tenements, always crowded as New York's east side has been for years, are jammed with humanity as never before, and during the severe winter when there was an epidemic of influenza here, old men and women and children died by the hundreds every day in this land of the poor.

City officials see no relief in sight until warmer weather comes, when they hope the people will gradually begin leaving for the country to work on farms.

## LAND BOOKLET RECEIVED.

The local land office this morning received a consignment of booklets containing descriptions of the land offered to entry on April 12. The land has been divided into units and each unit is shown in its proper classification together with a general description. Only a limited supply of these booklets was furnished but more are expected each day. Those calling at the office are given copies and as soon as the second shipment arrives they will be mailed out to all those who have requested them and to all who have received or obtained maps. The booklets contain the general information desired and will enable prospec-

pective settlers to obtain an idea of the nature of the land opened. It is shown that nearly all of the land is of a rolling nature, of clay soil, most of it being of use only for grazing purposes.

## TEAMS FOR CONFERENCE SELECTED

Big Inter-Church Conference Will Begin in This City On April 11th.

## STEREOPTICAN OUTFIT

County Conference Has Three Main Objectives—Twelve Exhibits Will Also Be Used to Bring Results Before People

Teams of speakers have been definitely selected for the Interchurch World Movement county conference which opens at the First Baptist Church at Lane and Rose streets in the city of Roseburg on April 11. The first meeting starts at 10:30 o'clock, and all sessions are open to persons interested in church activities.

Members of the team are as follows: Rev. R. E. Gurnall, Pendleton; Dr. W. A. Waldo, Portland; Rev. C. E. Dunham, Eugene; Mr. H. G. McPhee, Portland; Mrs. D. C. Kellems, Portland. Prominent among the members of the team are Rev. G. O. Oliver pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Pendleton and Mrs. D. C. Kellems, president of the Christian Woman's Board of Missions for Oregon. Mr. Oliver for ten years has been a member of the Oregon conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, and was religious work director of the army Y. M. C. A.

The county conference has three main objectives: To present surveys which reveal the needs of the world in life and money; presentation of the evangelistic and financial campaigns, and the rally of denominational and community forces for the complete organization of the county.

Twelve exhibits, in addition to the stereopticon apparatus, will be carried by the team for display at the conference and as an aid to bringing out the results of the surveys and the problems before the people of the county. A special man will accompany the teams to care for the lantern and stereopticon equipment.

The program of the conference is to begin with a statement of the Inter Church World Movement and world conditions today and will include the following: Presentation of the united financial and meetings of denominational rallies and meetings of special groups of state financial campaign directors; presentation of the foreign survey and World Outlook and Everyland; a composite departmental address; an explanation of the home surveys and the county surveys; an address on the program of evangelism; an explanation of the county organization by the convener for the county; a woman's address on cooperation and an address on layman's activities. It is planned that during the afternoon there will be a special meeting for young people and meetings for local church financial organizations. In the evening there will be a composite survey lantern slide address by the team leader.


