Horsemen, however, are of the opinion that the horse will again take his proper place when the "gas propelled concern" is found too expensive for the average man to "monkey" with. Demand for good horses is on the increase but the trouble is farmers got scared some years ago and quit breeding for market, so that few desirable young horses are to be found, and in the next few years it is predicted a premium will be paid for good stock. The war took a lot of horses and mules out of the country, and the scarcity is just beginning to be felt. The common belief that in a few years horses will only be seen in menageries is a mistake, as breeders are beginning to see where this talk is leading to. Some of the big farmers of the wheat belt in the middle west use both horses and tractors, and their experience is that the teams are just as cheap as the gas machine, so experts have stated. Ed. Kruse alleged today that good horses are now selling for from \$400 to \$500 a span.

EXPORTS ARE INCREASED

HONOLULU, T. H., March 29.—(By Mail)—Exports of the Territory of Hawaii to the mainland of the United States jumped \$22,000,000 during 1919, according to figures just announced by Raymer Sharp, special deputy collector of customs.

The total value of merchandise shipped from Hawaii to the mainland during 1919 was \$98,363,016 against \$75,759,749 for 1918. Imports from the mainland in 1919 totaled \$49,983,869 as against \$39,882,985 for 1918, an increase of \$10,100,884.
