SECRETARY GETS MANY QUESTIONS

Required to be Fully Informed On All Subjects In Order Answer Inquiries.

LETTERS ARE PERSONAL

All Letters Mailed Out Are of a Personal Nature and Circulars and Stamped Information Not Given Unless Requested.

Some people seem to think that the publicity department of the Chamber of Commerce is a sort of a concerning your section of Oregon. Letters that daily arrive as a part of the secretary's mail they would immediately change their opinion. The publicity man has to know anything from the price of bantam eggs to the size of a circus tent and if he is on to his job he gives an answer to each and every question. In this regard the Chamber of Commerce of Roseburg is making a reputation. Each letter received is answered by a personal letter and circulars are absolutely taboo. That means work. For instance here is a letter received only yesterday, from a resident of Idaho:

"As I am in want of a little information regarding your country, am writing you. I am a member of the Chamber of Commerce here and thought you could give me better advice than some. I am thinking of coming to your county, hence, I would like a little sound information and as I am in the transfer business here would like to know some thing of the business there. Could I use trucks there to any advantage in the winter? Could I get out-of-town contracts of hauling fruit or such like with a truck? What price do they pay for such work? What do they pay common labor there? Could I rent a house and at what figure per month? What could I buy a three or four-room house and lot for? What is partly improved land worth? What are potatoes worth? What is hay worth? What are good cows worth? What are good horses worth? If I should come this fall could I get work for the winter? Is there much dairying there? Have you a cream station? I rent a small farm? How hot does it get in the summer? How cold does it get in the winter? What do they raise? Please mail me a copy of your paper.

"If you will answer these few questions I will be much obliged to you."

The above questioner is a fair sample of the many applicants for information and the publicity man is kept busy digging up the information for such questions. If you don't believe it, try it yourself. Here is another writer in South Dakota:

"I would like a little information concerning your section of Oregon. First, what is land worth per acre, improved and unimproved? Second, is the unimproved covered with timber and if so what does it cost to get it cleared per acre? Third, what does it cost to get grapes enough to set out an acre, also what would strawberries, English walnuts and cherries cost per acre? Fourth, what are good dairy cows selling for, also good work horses? Fifth, what time does school begin out there? Sixth, what is house rent in Roseburg per month? Seventh, how soon do grapes come into bearing from the time of planting and how much does an average crop sell for. If you have any literature of your county send me some of it and oblige."

These letters are each answered by a personal letter answering specifically the questions asked and giving conservative, truthful statements of the city and its surroundings. Some of the questions asked cause the secretary a great deal of work to secure answers but as a record is kept he has on hand a great deal of information concerning prices of nearly everything about which the prospective homeseeker inquires.

Many letters of thanks have been received lately from persons who appreciate the candid manner in which the Chamber of Commerce discusses local conditions. This is especially true regarding ex-servicemen who are seeking information on the grant lands. They have been shown that the land is practically valueless and are grateful for the information which has saved them the time, expense and disappointment of coming to this country, with the plan of settling on a homestead.

It is reported from the Chamber of Commerce office that the volume of mail is steadily increasing, proving that Roseburg is becoming more and more a homeseeker's paradise.

Ex-Marine Gets "Stung" on Lands

Yesterday an ex-marine, who fought his way through the German line at Chateau-Thierry and Belleau Wood, receiving a severe wound in the latter engagement, presented himself at the Chamber of Commerce office and asked for assistance in locating the O. & C. grant lands. He had been fired by the rays of his home town in Minnesota, and with a worthy ambition to make a fortune for himself, came to the west to take up some of the free land on which soldiers, sailors and marines are given a "preference" right. He went to the land office where he was furnished with a map and guide book, which only served to confuse him the more, and at last came to the Chamber of Commerce for aid. In the meantime some kind-hearted citizen had told him of a certain section which might prove tillable and he wanted assistance in looking it up. The piece was one of the best, probably, in the grant. At least the book said it was tillable, but a short inquiry located it in the clay hills back of Riddle, a piece of ground fit only for raising digger squirrels and poison oak, a place where a respectable goat would refuse to graze. The young fellow thanked the secretary for his assistance and then went out to find a job which would pay him money enough to get back home. This is all happening weeks before the time comes for ex-soldiers to exercise their rights. Soon the date which has been greatly vaunted in the middle west will arrive and with it will come many men who are anxious to secure lands which they believe are of great value. The disappointed ones are not going to be

boosters for Douglas county and consequently it behooves all organizations to protect the community against false impressions by spreading the truth concerning these lands.

HOMES FOR SOLDIERS.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 8.—Forty-seven dwellings, to be sold to veterans on the long term payment plan, have been constructed or are under construction by the city of Vancouver, it was announced recently. The provisional government turned over \$300,000 to the city to be used as a revolving fund for the construction of the homes. The fund was obtained by the province from the Dominion government, under the soldiers' housing act.

Most of the homes are modern, five-room dwellings, to cost the former soldier approximately \$3750, including the lot. Payments are made like monthly rental. Soldiers' widows' and incapacitated veterans' claims were first considered.

WHAT IS JAZZY JAG.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 8.—What is a "jazzy jag?" The attorney general of British Columbia has been asked to answer this question before the present term of the provincial legislature closes.

In a set of questions filed in the legislature, Mr. Pooley, member for Esquimalt asks the attorney general for particulars as to the amount of alcohol purchased by a Vancouver company during the last three years to be used in the manufacture of a flavoring extract. Finally he asks: "Does the extract manufactured produce what is technically known as a 'jazzy jag' among its users?"
