ROSE SCHOOL RIPPLES.

An arithmetic test was held in Miss Pickens' room Friday. Those receiving highest grades were Marguerita Little, Jessie Judd, Virgil Lynn, Casson Greenman and Robert Dawe.

The paper drive is still on. Approximately six tons of paper, besides a large amount of old rags, rubber and copper, have already been collected. Until the collection is weighed it will be impossible to say definitely which room has won in the contest, although Miss Moody's room seems to be slightly in the lead at present. The students of the lower grades have been giving the older pupils a hard run for their money.

Pupils of the Rose school above the fourth grade were given an opportunity Friday afternoon to see a moving picture dealing with pure-bred cattle, which was shown at the high school auditorium. The pictures were taken at the big Northwest Livestock show held in Portland a few months ago and were brought to Roseburg by O. M. Finner, who explained the pictures as they were shown. One part, particularly interesting to students in agriculture, showed an expert stock judge explaining the prize-winning points of a young Holstein sire.

Mr. Finner urged the importance of raising pure-bred cattle and declared it could be done with an little expense as raising "scrabs."

The ball game scheduled with Benson school had to be postponed once more on account of rain.

Two new students registered in the 7th A this week. One was F. Goodman, who has been in school at Oakland, Oregon, and the other was Paul Saunders, who was transferred from the Benson school by Supt. A. G. Smith.

Edna May Enloe, 6th grade, returned to school this week after having been absent quite a while on account of smallpox.

The Rose school teachers met Wednesday evening after school and decided to have a spelling and arithmetic contest with the Benson school if satisfactory arrangements can be made. The plan is to carry the contest through the grades, beginning with the third grade in spelling and probably in the 1st A in numbers. The list of spelling words and arithmetic questions will probably be made up by some outside persons selected by Supt. Smith, and will be presented to the respective grades at the Benson and Rose schools at the same time. The spelling will be written. The contest will not be held for several weeks so that the students will have plenty of time to prepare.
