Roseburg to Receive Ad Men

Roseburg is on the schedule of the tour of the Pacific Coast Ad Men's caravan. The original schedule has been amended, and the caravan, together with those arriving from Vancouver, B. C., Mount Vernon, Washington, Seattle, Chehalis, are supposed to arrive in Roseburg on a noon run from Eugene. They will be here the night of the 19th of May.

No opportunity should be neglected to make something of this big advertising campaign. The daily runs and the details of this big caravan are going to be heralded all over the country. Most of the towns where they stop for noon lunches and for the night are making elaborate plans for their entertainment and here is another opportunity for the Roseburg band.

The caravan is traveling in two divisions. The first will be known as the "Chinook division," which includes all entries from points south of the Columbia river, the second, or the "Siwash division," includes all points north of the Columbia river. If there are any Roseburg dealers or private car owners desiring to accompany this caravan into Stockton, it is necessary that they make their wishes known before May 1st, for any entries made after that date will not be included in the itinerary and accommodations will not be arranged and they will have to shift for themselves.

Douglas County Needs Game Warden

Although it is not generally known, Frank B. Herrington, district game warden for Douglas county, who has been serving in that capacity for some time, has resigned his position which became effective April 1, and at the present time Douglas county is without a regular game warden. Ed. Walker, deputy warden for Jackson county, arrived here several days ago by order of the state commission and will serve temporarily and confer with the local sportsmen's league and county residents concerning the appointment of a new warden. Yesterday afternoon Mr. Walker stated to D. B. Bulgar, president of the Umpqua Sportsmen's League, that he would highly recommend Riley Hammerley, a resident of the Happy Valley section. Mr. Hammerley served with Mr. Walker as warden in Jackson county for four years and during that time gained for himself an enviable record. He has signified his willingness of serving as game warden in this county and it is very probable that the league will endorse him for appointment by the state game commission.
