COUNTY AGENTS SAVE FARMERS MILLION DOLLARS

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 12.—Nearly a million dollars was saved to the farmers of Oregon through the work of the county agents, according to the annual report of Paul V. Maria, county agent leader. This was done at the cost of \$99,475, or approximately \$10 saved to \$1 spent. County agents were employed in 23 of the 36 counties of the state last year and three additional counties have employed county agents this year. Thirteen of the 26 county agents in the state are graduates of the Oregon Agricultural college here.
